- Come to school every day on time

BE RESPONSIBLE ON THE PLAY STRUCTURE

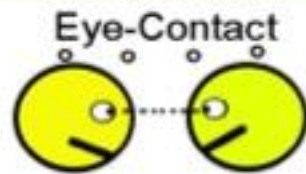
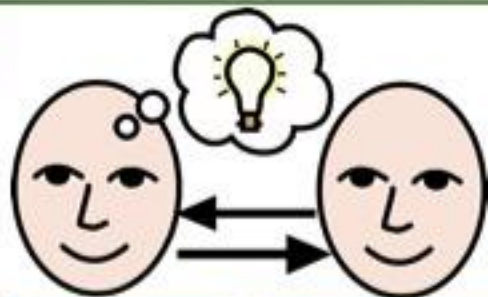


PLAYGROUND RULES

- Kicking balls is meant for the grass only. The blacktop is unsafe.
- When the warning bell rings, you must come off of the grass to the blacktop (Use the restroom and get a drink of water). There should be no lingering.
- When the bell rings, bring the balls, hula hoops and jump ropes in and put them away. The bell ringing does NOT mean to take one last shot.
- Stay away from the far end of the fence (backstop is boundary)
- Keep hands to self! (NO tag!)

BEHAVIORS WE DON'T EXPECT TO SEE...

- Threatening others verbally, physically or with the use of technology.
- Bullying: physical, written, verbally harass, threaten, cyberbully (harmful texts, sounds, images)
- Fighting will not be tolerated!
- DANGER! Do not get in/out of your car on Acacia St.
- Kicking balls on blacktop. Eating while playing. No tag
- Playing after the bell rings. Come back from the field
- Destruction of property
- Put Downs



WHAT EXACTLY IS BULLYING?

- Mean behavior repeated over time that is meant to hurt smaller or weaker people.
- Occurs in a relationship where there is an imbalance of power or strength.

DIRECT BULLYING

- Hitting, kicking, shoving, spitting, stealing
- Taunting, teasing in a mean way, racial slurs, verbal harassment
- Threatening or mean gestures

iNDiRECT BULLYiNG

- Spreading rumors
- Deliberately excluding someone from a group or activity
- Horseplay or jokes that could be hurtful
- Cyber-bullying (Facebook, Instagram, Snapchat, etc.)

CYBER-BULLYING

- Sending mean texts, emails and/or instant messages
- Posting bad pictures or messages in blogs, social media websites or other websites
- Using someone else's name or user name to spread rumors or lies about someone.

BULLYING OR NOT?

John thinks he is the boss of the handball court. He tells other people they are out, calls them names, pushes people in line and doesn't follow any of the rules.

BULLYING OR NOT?

Erica tells another girl things like this every day:

- “That is such an ugly shirt.”
 - “When was the last time you took a shower?”
 - “You look really fat today.”
 - “Those are the ugliest shoes I have ever seen.”
 - “I’m not sitting by you at the lunch tables.”
 - “I wish you didn’t go to this school.”

BULLYING OR NOT?

James loves to play football. When he goes for a catch, he runs into someone else and they fall down. James helps them up and says he is sorry.

BULLYING

WHAT CAN YOU DO?

Say what you feel.

Tell a trusted adult.

Ask other friends to help.

Never leave the targeted person alone.

Don't encourage the bully

UNDERSTAND THAT YOU CAN MAKE A DIFFERENCE!

DRESS FOR SUCCESS

Dress, hair styles or makeup which are of a distracting nature or interfere with the study habits of students are *not acceptable*.

Dress for SUCCESS = Attitude and Behavior
