## **FAIR Education Act**

Studies Weekly provides a fully aligned and integrated History and Social Science K–6 program that presents a fair approach to all people and perspectives. Studies Weekly's currently adopted curriculum meets the FAIR Act's requirements as directed by the Standards Review Panel, IQC, Board of Education and the FAIR Act Coalition. The updated curriculum is approved as a supplemental program.

All people are represented in an appropriate and balanced manner, as required by the Fair Act, to show accurate and inclusive history by including contributions of individuals from any minority or majority group. This approach is centered around people who make contributions and take part in historical events. While biographies and other articles include reference to ethnicity, race, gender, affinity, etc., the focus is on the person, not on the label. Studies Weekly articles are not designed to educate on adult topics.

Per the California History-Social Science Framework, our instructional materials use biography to portray the experiences of men, women, and children. Our materials include the roles and contributions of people from different demographic groups: Native Americans, African Americans, Mexican Americans, Asian Americans, Pacific Islanders, European Americans, LGBTQ+ Americans, persons with disabilities, and members of other ethnic and cultural groups per Education Code Section 60040.

- Our content is well organized and consistent with the essential knowledge and skills described in the standards and framework.
- The vocabulary is presented in a manner that provides instructional opportunities for teachers and appropriate practice for all students.
- Studies Weekly uses a detailed, expository narrative approach for in-depth study that focuses on people and their ideas, thoughts, actions, conflicts, struggles, and achievements.
- Explanations are provided so that students understand causes and reasons for events and their outcomes.
- The publications unify facts, explanations, graphics, maps, related media and literary selections to aid students' deeper understanding and retention of the events.
- Topics build upon each other in a systematic manner and are enriched with materials and activities.
- Studies Weekly provides strategies for universal access for all types of learners, including vocabulary, reading and language skills of English learners in social studies.
