## About Our School

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Orangethorpe Elementary School was established in 1949 and is located on a major street in the southwestern section of the city of Fullerton. It is bordered by a public park to the south with residential homes to the East and businesses to the North. We currently have 573 students enrolled in the school serving grades PreK-6 as a Title I school. Our school community is comprised of: 78% Hispanic/Latino, 9% White, 6% Asian, 2% African American, 1% and Native Hawaiian/Pacific Islander, 4% two or more races; 82.8% participating in free and reduced lunch; 37.5% of our students are English Learners; and 22% are Reclassified as Fluent-English Proficient.

Our school community is comprised of the Orangethorpe Staff, Parents, and Community. Without committed parents and community, our goals could not be met. The Orangethorpe staff is also committed to improving student learning by analyzing data in order to plan for the current and future needs of our students. Looking at demographics, perceptions, school processes, and student learning will enable us to make continuous school improvement.

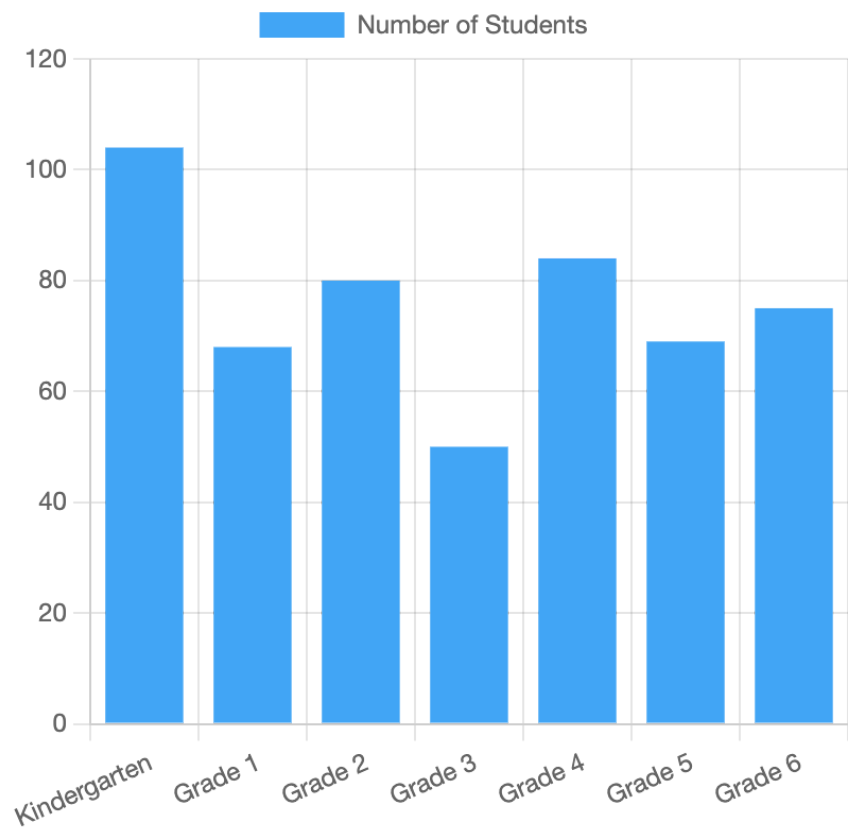

## School Facility Conditions and Planned Improvements

The District takes great efforts to ensure that all schools are clean, safe, and functional. Listed below is more specific information on the condition of the school and the efforts made to ensure that students are provided with a clean, safe, and functional learning environment. Orangethorpe Elementary School has 31 classrooms, a library media center, and a multi-purpose room. The main campus was built in 1951. Additions were constructed in 1954, 1956 and 1964. Eleven portable classrooms were added between 1963 and 2002. District maintenance staff ensures that the repairs necessary to keep the school in good repair and working order are completed in a timely manner. A work order process is used to ensure efficient service and that emergency repairs are given the highest priority. The District has established cleaning standards for all schools in the district. A summary of these standards is available at the district maintenance office. The Maintenance and Operations staff works with the custodial staff to develop cleaning schedules to ensure a clean and safe school. The District participates in the State School Deferred Maintenance Program, which provides state matching funds on a dollar-for-dollar basis, to assist school districts with expenditures for major repair or replacement of existing school building components. Typically, this includes roofing, plumbing, heating, air conditioning, electrical systems, interior and exterior painting, and floor systems. During 2023-24, the District spent \$0 on Deferred Maintenance. For the 2024-25 school year, the District budgeted \$5 for Deferred Maintenance expenditures.

The key elements of the plan include: a) providing a safe teaching and learning environment for all students and staff members, b) ensuring that all students are safe and secure while at school-sponsored activities, c) making district programs and community resources available to students and parents, and d) creating a school where students, programs, and community members interact in an atmosphere of mutual respect that enhances the environment for learning. Each year the school submits along with the safety plan a detailed "action plan" which addresses the identified areas the staff and School Site Council has brought forward as critical areas of concern or how they should improve. A copy of the plan is available at all times in the school office and will provide a more detailed description of each element of the plan including specific actions, resources, and timelines to be implemented by the school. 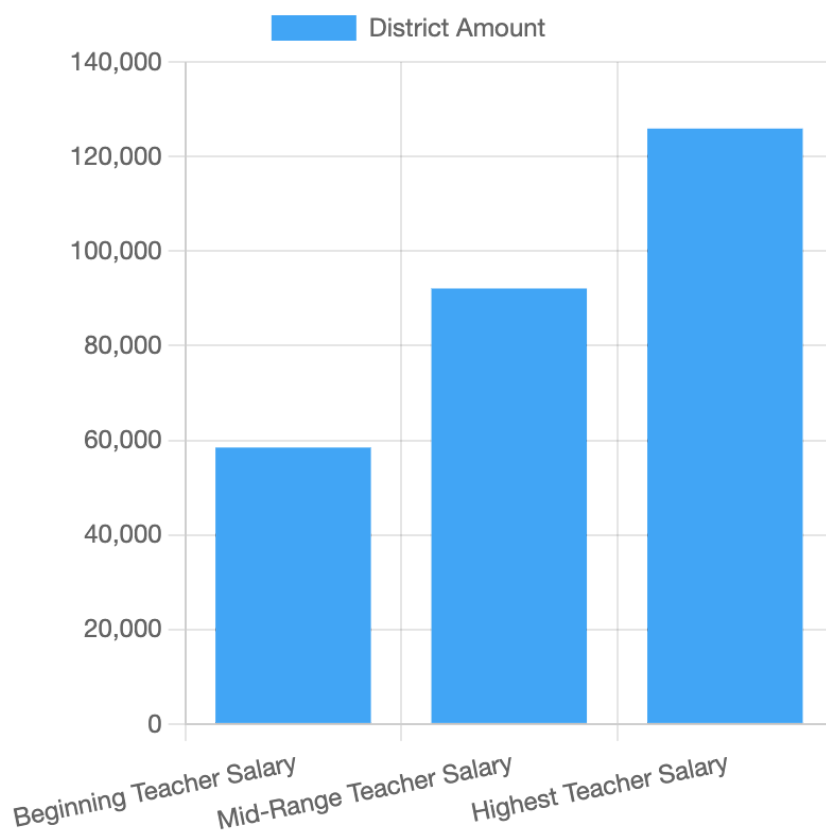

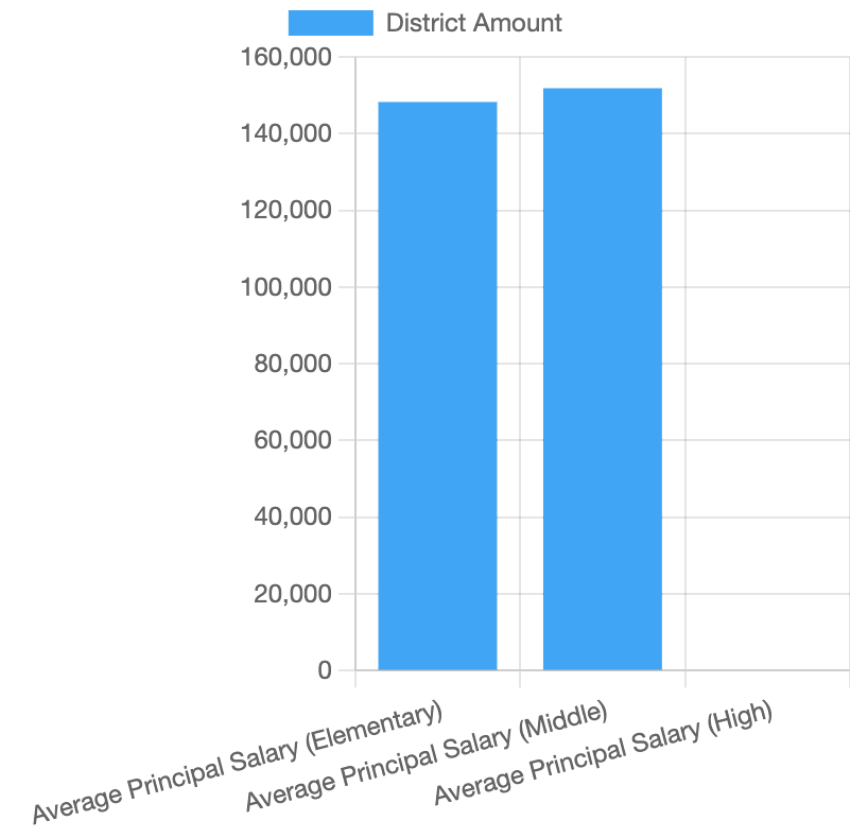
