Pacific Drive is a Computer Science and Innovation school with a Dual Language Spanish Immersion strand. As a school community, Pacific Drive prepares students for a future of creativity and critical thinking to embrace diversity on a global scale.

Our Computer Science and Innovation program provides all students access to a comprehensive coding and robotics pathway. Pacific Drive is a 1:1 iPad school in Transitional Kindergarten through 5th grade along with a 1:1 take home laptop program for 6th graders. A device is assigned to each student and students are able to use their device while at school and at home. Through project based learning opportunities, students consider solutions to problems within their local and world communities. School wide Computer Science Pathway integration provides students with 21st century skills, content knowledge, and visual literacy needed to be college and career ready.

Pacific Drive's dual language Spanish immersion program is in its sixth year. Currently, dual immersion classes are available in Transitional Kindergarten (TK) through 5th grade. In the upcoming school year, adding a class in sixth grade will complete the program. This program provides students with the opportunity to learn academic content while acquiring the ability to speak, read, write, and listen in another language. The ultimate goal of this program is bilingualism, biliteracy, and biculturalism. The entire Pacific Drive community is proud of student achievement in dual immersion classes.



School Facility Conditions and Planned Improvements

The District takes great efforts to ensure that all schools are clean, safe, and functional. Listed below is more specific information on the condition of the school and the efforts made to ensure that students are provided with a clean, safe, and functional learning environment. Pacific Drive Elementary School has 36 classrooms, a library media center, and a multipurpose room. The main campus was built in 1957. Additions were constructed in 1960 and 1972. The multipurpose room was completed in 2006. Three portable classrooms were added between 1989 and 1998, two more were added in 2000 and one more in 2002. District maintenance staff ensures that the repairs necessary to keep the school in good repair and working order are completed in a timely manner. A work order process is used to ensure efficient service and that emergency repairs are given the highest priority. The District has established cleaning standards for all schools in the district. A summary of these standards is available at the district maintenance office. The Maintenance and Operations staff works with the custodial staff to develop cleaning schedules to ensure a clean and safe school. The District participates in the State School Deferred Maintenance Program, which provides state matching funds on a dollar-for-dollar basis, to assist school districts with expenditures for major repair or replacement of existing school building components. Typically, this includes roofing, plumbing, heating, air conditioning, electrical systems, interior and exterior painting, and floor systems. During 2022-23, the District spent \$0 on Deferred Maintenance. For the 2023-24 school year, the District budgeted \$5 for Deferred Maintenance expenditures.

School Safety Plan (School Year 2023-24)

A comprehensive school safety plan was developed and approved in compliance with Education Code Sections 33126, 35256, and 32286 as well as applicable District policies and regulations. Each year, prior to March 1, the school's safety plan is reviewed, updated and discussed with staff and School Site Council. Annually, staff report on the status of its safety plan with the school leadership team, PTA, and School Site Council. Status reports and updates are reviewed at the beginning of each school year and again in December before the finished School Safety Plan is approved by the members of the School Site Council by March 1. The key elements of the plan include: a) providing a safe teaching and learning environment for all students and staff members, b) ensuring that all students are safe and secure while at school sponsored activities, c) making district programs and community resources available to students and parents, and d) creating a school where students, programs, and community members interact in an atmosphere of mutual respect that enhances the environment for learning. Each year the school submits along with the safety plan a detailed "action plan" which addresses the identified areas the staff and School Site Council has brought forward as critical areas of concern or how they should improve. A copy of the plan is available at all times in the school office and will provide a more detailed description of each element of the plan including specific actions, resources and time lines to be implemented by the school. Copies are also available at the District Office in the office of Child Welfare and Attendance.


