The root *mot* as in *motion* means "to move, to do." The root *numer* as in *numeral* means "number." All of the following key words start with either the root *mot* or the root *numer*. In each key word, circle the root.



n. A hotel or a group of cabins by the road for motorists.

After a long day of riding in the car, we were glad to get into our room at the motel.



NOTA BENE

The word *motel* combines the beginning of the word *motorist* (a person driving a car) with the ending of the word *hotel*. Our language sometimes adds new words by combining old words. The word *smog* is a combination of *smoke* and *fog*. A meal eaten late in the morning is called *brunch* because it is after *breakfast* and before *lunch*. New words come into our language in many ways, but one of the handiest ways is by combining.

2. motionless (mo' shan lis)


adj. Not moving at all, still.

From a distance the surface of the lake looked as motionless as a pane of glass.

3. motivate (mō' tə vāt)

v. To move a person to action, to make a person eager to do something.

A love of science motivated the young woman to become an astronaut.



n. The reason or cause someone does something.

Helene's motive for babysitting is to earn money for the school trip to Washington, D.C.



5. motor (mo' ter)

n. A machine that uses some form of power, like electricity or gas, to make something move.

Maggie used pliers and a screwdriver to make a simple repair on the motor.



NUMER (from the Latin word *numerus* meaning "number")

n. The number that is above the line, or to the left of the line, in a fraction.

In the fraction $\frac{3}{8}$, the numerator is 3.

7. numerical (nü mer'i kəl)


adj. Related to numbers, or a series of numbers.

Our teacher told us to list our spelling test scores in numerical order from the lowest to the highest.

The adjective suffix -less

The key word *motionless* ends in the suffix -less. Words ending in -less are usually adjectives. Adjectives <u>describe</u> people, places, and things. Examples: helpless babies, cloudless skies, useless junk. When the suffix -less is added to a word, the meaning of the word changes.

Less can also stand alone. Then, it is a word meaning "fewer; a smaller amount." You can say, "After dogs shed, they have less hair," or "If you would talk less, you might learn more." In these sentences, less is a word, not a suffix.
