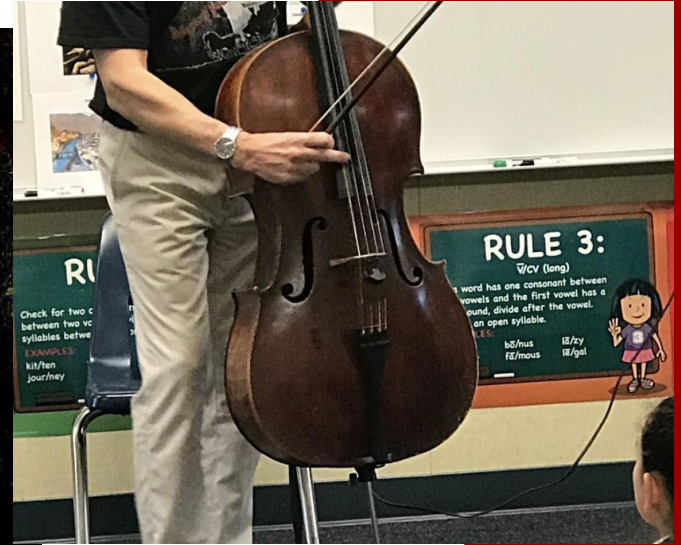
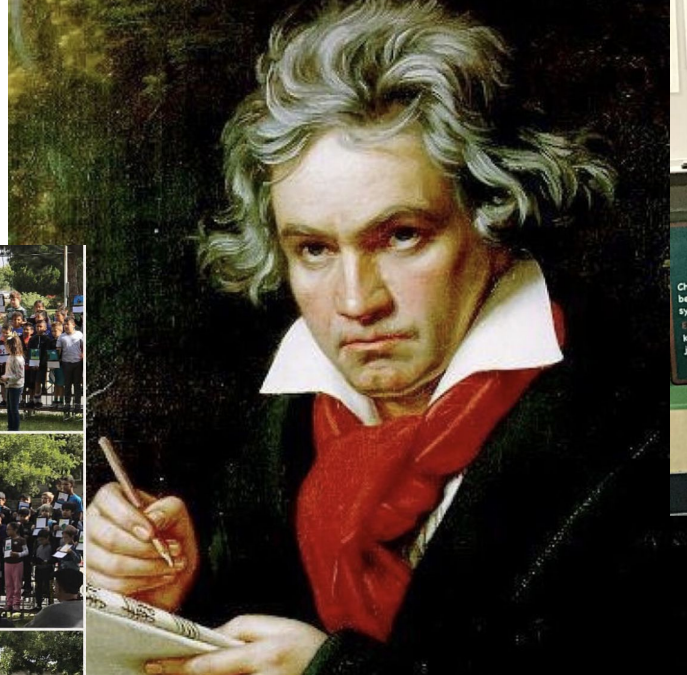

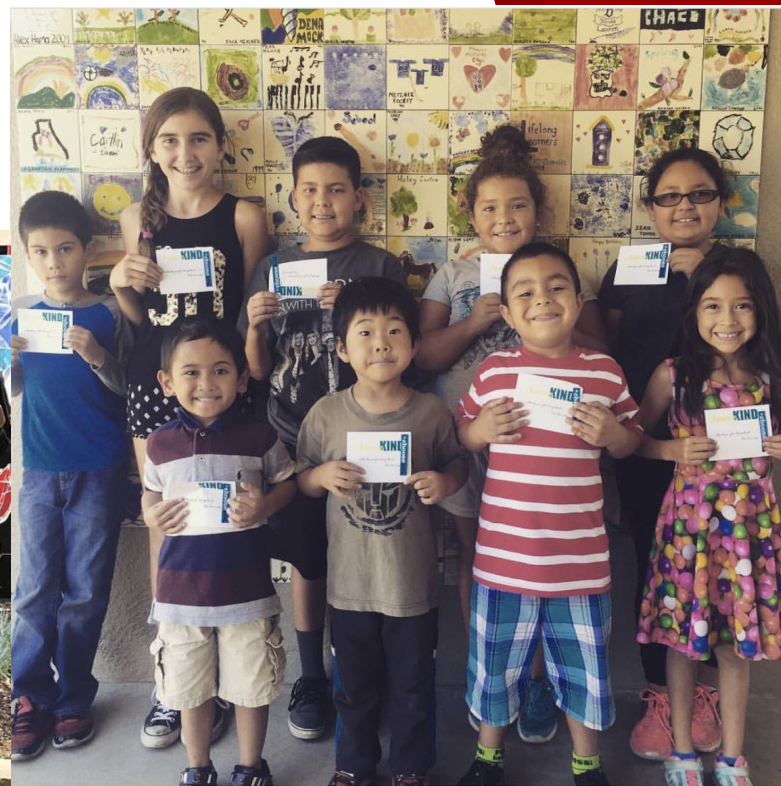

English Language Advisory Committee (ELAC)



- ▶ School Site level
- ▶ 21 or more English Language Learners (ELL)
- ▶ Group of parents that provides advice to school regarding program and services for ELL students

District English Language Advisory Committee (DELAC)



- ▶ District level
- ▶ 51 or more English learners (EL)
- ▶ Advise the district's local governing board on programs and services for English learners

ELAC Site Representatives may run for Chair or Co-chair position

Chair/Co-chair Responsibilities:

- Meet with Educational Services Team to provide input to DELAC Agendas
- Co-lead DELAC meetings
- Co-present an DELAC update to the School Board

Aligned with the 1999 California English Language Development (ELD) Standards with five proficiency levels	Must be aligned with the 2012 California ELD Standards, which have three proficiency levels (Emerging, Expanding, and Bridging)
One test used for two purposes: initial assessment and annual assessment	Two separate tests for two purposes: (1) initial identification; and (2) annual summative assessment. The initial identification will be brief and locally scored.
Paper-pencil tests	Paper-pencil tests with a potential to transition to computer-based tests
July 1–October 31 Annual Assessment window	Annual Summative Assessment window to be a four month period after January 1 (proposed February 1–May 31), allowing for more pre-test instructional time

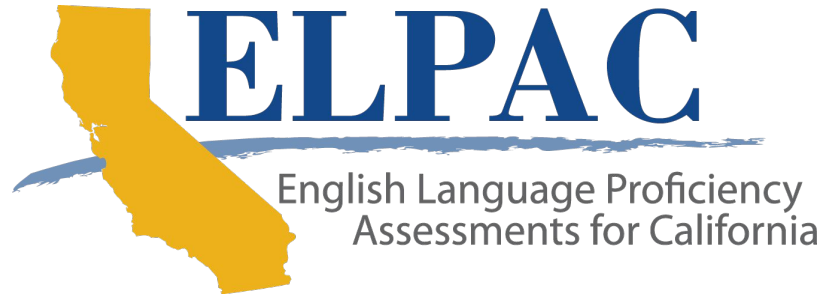

Deferred Action Childhood Arrivals (DACA)



What is the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals program?

- The program allows young undocumented immigrants who entered the country before their 16th birthday — and have been in the U.S. since June 15, 2007 — to receive a renewable two-year period of deferred action from deportation as long as they meet specific guidelines.
- The individuals also receive eligibility for a work permit.



How many individuals are impacted in California by DACA?

The U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services has approved 242,339 DACA applications from California residents since 2012



Does this change immigration enforcement for students in K-12 schools?

- Immigration and Customs Enforcement, or ICE, has historically maintained that daycares, pre-schools and other early learning programs; primary schools; secondary schools; post-secondary schools up to and including colleges and universities; and related sites are “sensitive locations.”
- These are places where “enforcement actions would not occur” unless prior approval was granted by a supervisory official at the site, other law enforcement actions were already taking place, or other extenuating circumstances.



Orange County Department of Education Stance

- Dr. Al Mijares, Orange County Superintendent of Schools states, “While we will continue to monitor developments, including the possibility of Congressional action, our staff at the Orange County Department of Education remains committed to doing everything in our power to support the safety, well-being and academic needs of the students we serve.”




Our Commitment:

The Fullerton School District has not changed its position on its commitment to the ALL students. We will continue to ensure that ALL students are safe, feel safe, while learning in an environment that is conducive to learning. Our Board of Education has allocated necessary funds to support our students not only through world-class academic programs, but also support systems that include mental-health.
