President Berryman called a Regular meeting of the Fullerton School District Board of Trustees to order at 4:05 p.m. and Lynn Thornley led the pledge of allegiance to the flag.

Call to Order, Pledge of Allegiance, and Report from Closed Session

The Board returned to Open Session at 5:40 p.m., and Lynn Thornley led the pledge of allegiance to the flag. President Berryman stated that in Closed Session the Board reviewed two requests for stipulated expulsions concerning student case #0910-02 and #0910-03. Regarding case #0910-02, it was moved by Hilda Sugarman, seconded by Minard Duncan, and carried 5-0 that the student be expelled from all the schools and programs of the District for the Spring Semester 2010, which ends on June 15, 2010. The Board finds that the student violated Education Code section 48900(c). Readmission to the District at the end of the expulsion period will be contingent upon satisfactory completion of the Rehabilitation Plan pursuant to California Education Code section 48916. The student may apply for readmission at the end of the expulsion order. Regarding case #0910-03, it was moved by Hilda Sugarman, seconded by Ellen Ballard, and carried 5-0 that the student be expelled from all the schools and programs of the District for the Spring Semester 2010, which ends on June 15, 2010, and the Fall Semester 2011, which ends on January 28, 2011. The Board finds that the student has violated Education section 48900(c) and 48900(d). Readmission to the District at the end of the expulsion period will be contingent upon satisfactory completion of the Rehabilitation Plan pursuant to California Education Code section 48916. The student may apply for readmission at the end of the expulsion order.

Dr. Hovey announced the Board approved 5-0 in Closed Session hiring Trang Lai as Principal of Robert C. Fisler School and spoke briefly about Mrs. Lai's background.

(GASOLINE & DIESEL)

Background: On August 21, 2007, the Fullerton School District's Board of Trustees approved

the original fuels bid and agreements to provide gasoline and diesel fuels for District vehicles. That bid and the applicable agreements expire in July 2010. A new bid was prepared and advertised on May 25 and June 1, 2010, with an opening date of Tuesday, June 15, 2010. Six bids were received by Newport-Mesa Unified School District and evaluated by all participating districts to insure adherence to district specifications and responsiveness according to Public Contract Code. It was determined that IPC (USA), Inc., a division of ITOCHU Corporation, should be awarded the contract for fuel (gasoline and diesel) based on price per gallon, octane level, and delivery quantity/size as listed on the bid pricing sheets. IPC's weekly price will be 34.5¢ below the price of the Oil Price Information Service (OPIS). Documentation is available for review in

the Superintendent's office.

Rationale: The multi-district cooperative fuel bid will save District funds when purchasing

gasoline and diesel fuel, when required, for the next three years.

Funding: General Fund (01).

Recommendation: Approve Agreement for IPC (USA), Inc., a division of ITOCHU Corporation, to

provide gasoline and diesel fuels for District vehicles for a period of three years,

WHEREAS, DISTRICT is authorized by Section 53060 of the California Government Code to contract with and employ any persons for the furnishing of special services and advice in financial, economic, accounting, engineering, legal or administrative matters, if such persons are specially trained and experienced and competent to perform the special services required;

WHEREAS, DISTRICT is in need of such special services and advice; and WHEREAS, CONSULTANT is specially trained and experienced and competent to perform the special services required by the DISTRICT, and such services are needed on a limited basis;

NOW, THEREFORE, the parties agree as follows:

1. Services to be provided by CONSULTANT:

- 3. Compensation. DISTRICT agrees to pay the CONSULTANT for services satisfactorily rendered pursuant to this AGREEMENT a total fee not to exceed **Four Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$450.00) per participant.** Total contract price not to exceed a fee of **Nine Thousand Dollars (\$9,000.00).** CONSULTANT shall submit a billing statement to

the DISTRICT. DISTRICT shall pay CONSULTANT within thirty (30) days of DISTRICT'S approval of the invoice.

- 4. Expenses. DISTRICT shall not be liable to CONSULTANT for any costs or expenses paid or incurred by CONSULTANT in performing services for DISTRICT.
- 5. Independent Contractor. CONSULTANT, in the performance of this AGREEMENT, shall be and act as an independent contractor. CONSULTANT understands and agrees that he/she and all of his/her employees shall not be considered officers, employees or agents of the DISTRICT, and are not entitled to benefits of any kind or nature normally provided employees of the DISTRICT and/or to which DISTRICT'S employees are normally entitled, including, but not limited to, State Unemployment Compensation or Workers' Compensation. CONSULTANT assumes the full responsibility for his/her own acts and/or omissions and the acts and/or omissions of his/her employees or agents as they relate to the services to be provided under this AGREEMENT. CONSULTANT shall assume full responsibility for payment of all federal, state and local taxes or contributions, including unemployment insurance, social security and income taxes with respect to CONSULTANT and/or CONSULTANT'S employees.
- 6. Materials. CONSULTANT shall furnish, at his/her own expense, all labor, materials, equipment, supplies and other items necessary to complete the services to be provided pursuant to this AGREEMENT. CONSULTANT'S services will be performed, findings obtained, reports and recommendations prepared in accordance with generally and currently accepted principles and practices of his/her profession.
- 7. Originality of Services. CONSULTANT agrees that all materials, technologies, formulae, procedures, processes, methods, writings, ideas, dialogue, compositions, recordings, teleplays, and/or video productions prepared for, written for, submitted to the DISTRICT and/or used in connection with this AGREEMENT, shall be wholly original to CONSULTANT and shall not be copied in whole or in part from any other source, except that submitted to CONSULTANT by DISTRICT as a basis for such services.
- 8. Copyright/Trademark/Patent. CONTRACTOR understands and agrees that all matters produced under this AGREEMENT shall become the property of DISTRICT and cannot be used without DISTRICT'S express written permission. DISTRICT shall have all

right, title and interest in said matters, including the right to secure and maintain the copyright, trademark and/or patent of said matter in the name of the DISTRICT. CONTRACTOR consents to use of CONTRACTOR'S name in conjunction with the sale, use, performance and distribution of the matters, for any purpose and in any medium.

- 9. Termination. DISTRICT may, at any time, with or without reason, terminate this AGREEMENT and compensate CONSULTANT only for services satisfactorily rendered to the date of termination. Written notice by DISTRICT shall be sufficient to stop further performance of services by CONSULTANT. Notice shall be deemed given when received by the CONSULTANT or no later than three days after the day of mailing, whichever is sooner.
- 10. Hold Harmless. CONSULTANT agrees to and does hereby indemnify, hold harmless and defend the DISTRICT and its Governing Board, officers, employees and agents from every claim or demand made and every liability, loss, damage or expense, of any nature whatsoever, which may be incurred by reason of any act, neglect, default, or omission of the CONSULTANT, or any person, firm or corporation employed by the CONSULTANT, either directly or by independent contract, arising out of, or in any way connected with, the services covered by this AGREEMENT.
- 11. Insurance. Pursuant to Section 10, CONSULTANT agrees to carry a comprehensive general and automobile liability insurance to protect CONSULTANT and DISTRICT against liability or claims of liability that may arise out of this AGREEMENT. Such insurance as is afforded by this policy shall be primary, and any insurance carried by DISTRICT shall be excess and noncontributory.
- 12. Assignment. The obligations of the CONSULTANT pursuant to this AGREEMENT shall not be assigned by the CONSULTANT.
- 13. Compliance With Applicable Laws. The services to be provided herein must meet the approval of the DISTRICT and shall be subject to the DISTRICT'S general right to secure the satisfactory completion thereof. CONSULTANT agrees to comply with all federal, state and local laws, rules, regulations and ordinances that are now or may in the future become applicable to CONSULTANT, CONSULTANT'S business, equipment and personnel engaged in services covered by this AGREEMENT or accruing out of the

performance of such services.

- 14. Permits/Licenses. CONSULTANT and all CONSULTANT'S employees or agents shall secure and maintain in force such permits and licenses as are required by law in connection with the furnishing of services pursuant to this AGREEMENT.

WHEREAS, following a special election of the qualified electors of the District, this Board on June 27, 2000, acting as the governing body of the District, adopted Ordinance No. 99/00-1 ("Ordinance") which provided for the levying and collection of special taxes within the District, "as provided in the Act and Ordinance and as approved by the qualified electors"; and

WHEREAS, it is now necessary and appropriate that this Board levy and collect the special taxes for Fiscal Year 2010/2011 by the adoption of a Resolution as specified by the Act and Ordinances.

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY ORDERED AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. In accordance with the Act and Ordinances, there is hereby levied upon all properties within the District, including all annexed territory, which are not otherwise exempt from taxation under the Act or Ordinances, the special taxes for Fiscal Year 2010/2011 set forth in the Ordinances at the tax rates as set forth therein and in Exhibit "A" hereto, as may be amended without further action of the Board to reflect updated information on assessor's parcel numbers from the County of Orange. The Assistant Superintendent, Business Services is hereby authorized and directed to establish the final rates to be levied, which final rates shall not exceed the maximum rates.

- <u>Section 2</u>. The above-authorized special taxes shall be collected in the same manner as ad valorem property taxes on the secured roll by the Treasurer-Tax Collector of the County of Orange and shall be subject to the same penalties and the same procedure and sale in cases of delinquency as provided for such ad valorem taxes.
- Section 3. The Clerk and Assistant Superintendent of Business are hereby authorized to transmit a certified copy of this Resolution to the Orange County Auditor-Controller, together with other supporting documentation as may be required, in order to place said special taxes on the secured property tax roll for Fiscal Year 2010/2011 and to perform all other acts which are required by the Act, Ordinances or by-law in order to accomplish the purpose of this Resolution.

In accordance with the Act and Ordinances, there is hereby levied upon all properties within the District, including all annexed territory which are not otherwise exempt from taxation under the Act or Ordinances, the special taxes for Fiscal Year 2010/2011 set forth in the Ordinances at the tax rates as set forth therein and in Exhibit "A" hereto, as may be amended without further action of the Board to reflect updated information on assessor's parcel numbers from the County of Orange. The Assistant Superintendent, Business Services is hereby authorized and directed to establish the final rates to be levied, which final rates shall not exceed the maximum rates.
- Section 2. The above-authorized special taxes shall be collected in the same manner as ad valorem property taxes on the secured roll by the Treasurer-Tax Collector of the County of Orange and shall be subject to the same penalties and the same procedure and sale in cases of delinquency as provided for such ad valorem taxes.
- Section 3. The Clerk and Assistant Superintendent of Business are hereby authorized to transmit a certified copy of this Resolution to the Orange County Auditor-Controller, together with other supporting documentation as may be required in order to place said special taxes on the secured property tax roll for Fiscal Year 2010/2011 and to perform all other acts which are required by the Act, Ordinances or by-law in order to accomplish the purpose of this Resolution.

Fullerton. The Fullerton Collaborative has asked that Fullerton School District continue with this cooperative venture through taking action on the MOU.

Rationale: Approval of the Memorandum of Understanding between Fullerton School

District and the Fullerton Collaborative for the 2010/2011 school year would allow for the current Fullerton Collaborative Executive Director to continue in her role and maintain status as an employee with the Fullerton School District.

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

This Memorandum of Understanding between the Fullerton School District and the Fullerton Collaborative is for the purpose of supporting the District and Collaborative partnership in linking community resources that will benefit the students, parents and teachers of the District.

Responsibilities assumed by The Fullerton Collaborative:

Services provided by Fullerton Collaborative to the Fullerton School District:

- 1) Provide up to \$60,000* for one year to support the salary, statutory benefits, health and welfare of the Fullerton Collaborative Executive Director at 50% full time equivalent hours. Salary is based on the appropriate Step/Column rate for a Fullerton School District Teacher. Fifty percent of the total compensation will be provided by September 1, 2010 with the remainder by May 15, 2011.
 - *Any salary or benefit increase or decrease will be adjusted accordingly and be funded by the Fullerton Collaborative.
- 2) Collaborate with the Fullerton School District on establishing of goals, evaluation, monitoring of daily schedule, and requests for time off and sick leave for the Executive Director.
- 3) Provide an umbrella liability insurance policy of not less than two million dollars per occurrence, which covers the work of the Executive Director for the Fullerton Collaborative, the Board of Directors of the Collaborative and indemnifies the Fullerton School District.

Services provided by Executive Director in connection with Fullerton School District:

- 1) Work collaboratively with the Fullerton School District to obtain funds and successfully author and submit proposals to obtain grants for school programs.
- 2) Assist the District and schools to link with community partners for support services that will benefit students and their families, including Ten Commandment programs, dental clinics, wellness programs, homeless student support programs and other programs that the District identifies as requiring community collaboration.
- 3) Assist the Fullerton School District in supporting programs that support adopted District goals and objectives.
- 4) Increase awareness of school personnel regarding community services that may be of benefit to students and their families by providing regular presentations to teachers and school administrators.
- 5) Serve as a liaison for the Fullerton School District to parents and the community.
- 6) Assist the District in obtaining community input when requested by the District.
- 7) Support the District in its efforts to meet the needs of all students.
- 8) Submit a schedule prior to the beginning of each month detailing specific services, community events, and functions representing the Fullerton Collaborative and the Fullerton School District.
- 9) Submit an end-of-the-month report detailing hours worked, activities, and specific services representing the Fullerton Collaborative and the Fullerton School District.

- 10) Promote and support each of the District's foundations.
- 11) Participate in District School Attendance and Review Board (SARB) and Administrative Review Committee (ARC) as requested by the Fullerton School District.
- 12) Prepare and present an annual written report to the Superintendent/Board of Trustees detailing progress made towards the annual goals and objectives of the Fullerton Collaborative and their impact on established long-term goals.

Responsibilities assumed by the Fullerton School District:

Fullerton School District will provide management and supervision for the Fullerton Collaborative Executive Director:

- 1) Provide a 0.5 FTE Fullerton Collaborative Executive Director through the 2010/2011 school year, covering pro-rata salary, statutory benefits, health and welfare, and STRS, which will be fully reimbursed by the Collaborative.
- 2) Provide office space and computer access for the Executive Director.
- 3) Supervise the Executive Director in collaboration with the Board of Directors Chair pertaining to establishing goals, measuring performance, monitoring time, directing daily activities, approving sick leave and time off and managing personnel issues.

Fullerton School District direct participation in the Fullerton Collaborative:

- 1) Actively participate in Fullerton Collaborative meetings and designate a District employee to be a member of the Collaborative Board of Directors.
- 2) Collaborate on grant and fund development opportunities when determined to be in the best interest of the District, including support for the Fullerton Collaborative in its grant applications as appropriate.

Philosophy, Goals, Objectives and Comprehensive Plans Board Adopted: August 23, 2005

Board Revised:

When required by law or determined to be a useful tool to accomplish District and school goals, school site councils or other school advisory groups shall develop comprehensive school plans designed to enhance student achievement at individual school sites.

Single Plan for Student Achievement

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that a Single Plan for Student Achievement is prepared by the school site council as required by law for each school participating in specified state and/or federal categorical programs. (Education Code 41507, 41572, 52055.755, 64001)

Whenever feasible, any other school plan may be incorporated into the Single Plan for Student Achievement.

The Superintendent or designee shall review each school's single plan and ensure that it has been developed and approved by a properly constituted school site council, meets the content requirements for all programs included, is based on an analysis of current practices and student academic performance, and reasonably links improvement strategies to identified needs of the school and students. He/she shall submit to the Board of Trustees his/her recommendations for plan approval or recommendations regarding any subsequent material revisions of the plan.

The Board shall review and approve each school's Single Plan for Student Achievement at a regularly scheduled meeting. The Board also shall review and approve any subsequent revisions that include material changes affecting the academic programs for students participating in these categorical programs. The Board shall certify that, to the extent allowable under federal law, the plan is consistent with District local improvement plans required as a condition of receiving federal funding. (Education Code 64001)

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that principals and members of each site council receive training on the roles and responsibilities of the site council. To the extent necessary, he/she shall ensure that site councils receive the resources necessary in order to perform their role effectively.

School Site Categorical Block Grants

Upon receipt of State funding for school site block grants, the Board shall allocate the funds to District schools on an equal per-pupil basis. (AB 1802, Sec. 43, Statutes of 2006)

The school's use of the funds allocated through this block grant shall be proposed by the school site council or, if the school does not have a school site council, by a schoolwide advisory group or school support group. (AB 1802, Sec. 43, Statutes of 2006)

The Board encourages school site councils to fund the highest priority needs identified in school improvement plans. The school site council shall provide the Superintendent or designee and the Board with a written proposal that includes a statement of the identified need(s) and how the funds will be used to enhance the educational program.

Before the funds are encumbered or expended, the Board shall approve the site council's proposed use of the funds. If the Board does not approve the proposed use, the Board shall inform the school site council of the reasons for disapproval and request that the council review and revise its proposal. (AB 1802, Sec. 43, Statutes of 2006)

Philosophy, Goals, Objectives and Comprehensive Plans Board Adopted:

The Board of Trustees recognizes its responsibility to inform parents/guardians and the community about the conditions, needs, and progress at each District school and to provide data by which parents/guardians can make meaningful comparisons between schools. The process of gathering and analyzing data also provides opportunities for school and District staff to review achievements and identify areas for improvement.

The Board shall annually issue a School Accountability Report Card (SARC) for each school site. (Education Code 35256)

In preparing the District's report cards, the Superintendent or designee may choose to use or adapt the model template provided by the California Department of Education. If the model template is not used, the Superintendent or designee shall ensure that data are reported in a manner that is consistent with the definitions for school conditions as provided in the template. At least every three years, the Board shall compare the content of the District's report cards to the State's model template, recognizing that variances are allowed by law as necessary to meet local needs. (Education Code 33126.1, 35256)

The Board shall annually approve the SARCs for all District schools and shall evaluate the data contained in the SARCs as part of the Board's regular review of the effectiveness of the District's programs, personnel, and fiscal operations.

The Superintendent or designee shall develop strategies for communicating the information contained in the SARCs to all stakeholders, including opportunities for staff and the community to discuss their content.

Notification and Dissemination of SARCs

The Superintendent or designee shall annually publicize the issuance of the SARCs and notify parents/guardians that a paper copy will be provided upon request. On or before February 1st of each year, the Superintendent or designee shall make the SARCs available in paper copy and on the Internet. (Education Code 35256)

Philosophy, Goals, Objectives and Comprehensive Plans Board Adopted:

The Board of Trustees is committed to enabling all District students to meet State academic achievement standards and to narrowing the achievement gap among student groups. To that end, the Board shall assist all District schools, including those receiving federal Title I funds, to achieve adequate yearly progress, as defined by the State Board of Education.

Whenever a District school is identified by the California Department of Education as in need of program improvement (PI), the Superintendent or designee shall ensure that school improvement efforts are coordinated and aligned. He/she shall also revise the school's Single Plan for Student Achievement in accordance with law and as specified in administrative regulation.

Depending on the length of time a District school has been identified for PI, the District shall provide opportunities for student transfers, supplemental educational services, other corrective actions, and/or restructuring in accordance with law.

Program Evaluation

The Board shall annually review the adequate yearly progress of each District school based on State academic assessments and other indicators specified in the State plan for the No Child Left Behind Act. The Superintendent or designee shall publicize and disseminate the results of this review to parents/guardians, principals, schools, and the community so that the instructional program can be continually refined to help all students meet State academic standards. (20 USC 6316)

As necessary based on the results of these evaluations, the Board may require the Superintendent or designee to review and revise any of the school's reform plans, including the school's Single Plan for Student Achievement, allocate additional resources toward the implementation of the plan, and/or require more frequent monitoring of the school's progress in order to raise student achievement.

Title I Program Improvement Districts

BP 0520.3

Philosophy, Goals, Objectives and Comprehensive Plans Board Adopted:

The Board of Trustees shall annually review and analyze the District's performance in making adequate yearly progress (AYP) toward student achievement standards, in accordance with criteria established by the State Board of Education (SBE). The Board's review shall include an evaluation of whether District improvement efforts are aligned and adequately focused on increasing achievement levels for all students. As necessary, the Board and the Superintendent or designee shall take steps to improve District operations and programs to enable students to achieve proficiency.

Year 1-2 PI: Revision and Implementation of LEA Plan

In the event that the District is identified for Program Improvement (PI) by the California Department of Education (CDE), the Superintendent or designee shall, in accordance with law and administrative regulation, notify parents/guardians, administer a District self-assessment process, and revise the LEA plan. (20 USC 6316; Education Code 52055.57)

The revised LEA plan or plan addendum shall be approved by the Board and submitted to the CDE. The Superintendent or designee shall annually report to the Board regarding the implementation of the plan during Years 1 and 2 of the program.

The Superintendent or designee shall utilize available State and local resources to identify specific problems contributing to low student achievement and provide technical assistance and support to resolve those problems. He/she also shall work closely with individual school sites to raise student achievement in accordance with school plans.

Year 3 PI: Corrective Action

If the District does not make AYP after two years of receiving program funding, the Board shall cooperate with the Superintendent of Public Instruction (SPI) and the SBE in the identification and implementation of appropriate corrective actions.

The Board shall enter into a contract with a District Assistance and Intervention Team (DAIT) whenever the SPI and SBE determine this to be the most appropriate corrective action. Upon receiving a report of recommendations from the DAIT: (Education Code 52055.57, 52059)

- 1. The Board may, not later than 30 days after completion of the report, appeal to the SPI to be exempted from implementing one or more of the report's recommendations.
- 2. Not later than 60 days after completion of the report, the Board shall, at a regularly scheduled meeting, adopt the report recommendations, as modified by any exemptions granted by the SPI.

The Superintendent or designee shall establish a District leadership team to collaborate with the DAIT in the development and implementation of an action plan to address high-priority needs. This team may include site and District administrators, teacher leaders, special education teachers, English learner experts, fiscal officers, and other key personnel, as appropriate.

The Superintendent or designee shall monitor the District's progress in implementing the DAIT's recommendations and shall continually use student performance data to determine whether additional District or school site changes are necessary to improve student achievement.

Philosophy, Goals, Objectives and Comprehensive Plans Board Adopted:

The Board of Trustees believes that schools demonstrating the lowest performance on State indicators of student achievement should be assisted with additional resources and support focused on instructional improvement and student services. Such schools also need working conditions and learning environments that will attract and retain well-qualified teachers, administrators, and other staff. The Board desires to help such schools address their complex educational needs and achieve their annual growth targets.

Whenever the Superintendent of Public Instruction identifies a District school as ranking in decile 1 or 2 on the Academic Performance Index (API) and notifies the District that the school is eligible to participate in the State's Quality Education Investment program, the Board shall determine whether applying for this funding will help improve academic achievement at that school. The Superintendent or designee shall review the program requirements and recommend to the Board if it would be in the District's best interest to apply to use alternative program requirements that would provide for a higher level of academic achievement. Based on this determination, the Board may submit an application, including an application for an alternative program, on behalf of the school in order to obtain additional State funding for school improvement.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that each participating school uses program funds for the purposes expressed in law and administrative regulation. Activities carried out under this program shall be aligned with other school improvement efforts.

The Superintendent or designee shall monitor the progress of participating schools to evaluate the effectiveness of school efforts in increasing student achievement, as measured by the API and other indicators, increasing student attendance, and, for secondary schools, increasing graduation rates. If the Superintendent or designee determines that sufficient progress is not being made at a particular school, the Superintendent or designee shall determine what types of additional District resources and support should be provided to the school so that progress in increasing student achievement can be made.

Complaints Concerning Instructional Materials

BP 1312.2

Community Relations

Board Adopted: January 27, 1987

Board Revised:

The Board of Trustees uses a comprehensive process to adopt District instructional materials that is based on selection criteria established by law and Board policy and includes opportunities for the involvement of parents/guardians and community members. Complaints concerning the content or use of instructional materials, including textbooks, supplementary instructional materials, library materials, or other instructional materials and equipment, shall be properly and fairly considered using established complaint procedures.

Parents/guardians are encouraged to discuss any concerns regarding instructional materials with their child's teacher and/or the school principal. If the situation remains unresolved, a complaint may be filed using the process specified in the administrative regulation.

The District shall accept complaints concerning instructional materials only from staff, District residents, or the parents/guardians of children enrolled in a District school.

When deliberating upon challenged materials, the Superintendent or designee and/or review committee shall consider the educational philosophy of the District, the professional opinions of teachers of the subject and of other competent authorities, reviews of the materials by reputable bodies, the teacher's stated objectives in using the materials, community standards, and the objections of the complainant.

The Superintendent or designee will have the final decision concerning instructional materials.

The District's decision shall be based on educational suitability of the materials and the criteria established in Board policy and administrative regulation.

When any challenged instructional material is reviewed by the District, it shall not be subject to further reconsideration for 12 months, unless the Superintendent or designee determines that reconsideration is warranted.

Complaints related to sufficiency of textbooks or instructional materials shall be resolved pursuant to the District's Williams Uniform Complaint Procedures.

Fullerton School District Board Policy Employee Use of Technology

BP 4040

Personnel

Board Adopted: September 9, 2008

Board Revised:

The Board of Trustees recognizes that technological resources can enhance employee performance by offering effective tools to assist in providing a quality instructional program, facilitating communications with parents/guardians, students, and the community, supporting District and school operations, and improving access to and exchange of information. The Board expects all employees to learn to use the available technological resources that will assist them in the performance of their job responsibilities. As needed, employees shall receive professional development in the appropriate use of these resources.

Employees shall be responsible for the appropriate use of technology and shall use the District's technological resources primarily for purposes related to their employment.

Employees shall be notified that computer files and electronic communications, including email and voice mail, are not private. Technological resources shall not be used to transmit confidential information about students, employees, or District operations without authority.

Online/Internet Services

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that all District computers with Internet access have a technology protection measure that prevents access to visual depictions that are obscene or child pornography and that the operation of such measures is enforced. The Superintendent or designee may disable the technology protection measure during use by an adult to enable access for bona fide research or other lawful purpose. (20 USC 6777; 47 USC 254)

To ensure proper use, the Superintendent or designee may monitor employee usage of technological resources, including the accessing of email and stored files. Monitoring may occur at any time without advance notice or consent. When passwords are used, they must be known to the Superintendent or designee so that he/she may have system access.

The Superintendent or designee shall establish administrative regulations and an Acceptable Use Agreement, which outline employee obligations and responsibilities related to the use of District technology. He/she also may establish guidelines and limits on the use of technological resources. Inappropriate use may result in a cancellation of the employee's user privileges, disciplinary action, and/or legal action in accordance with law, Board policy, and administrative regulation.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide copies of related policies, regulations, and guidelines to all employees who use the District's technological resources. Employees shall be required to acknowledge in writing that they have read and understood the District's Acceptable Use Agreement.

Use of Cellular Phone or Mobile Communications Device

An employee shall not use a cellular phone or other mobile communications device for personal business while on duty, except in emergency situations and/or during scheduled work breaks.

Any employee that uses a cell phone or mobile communications device in violation of law, Board policy, or administrative regulation shall be subject to discipline and may be referred to law enforcement officials as appropriate.

Instruction

Board Adopted: November 28, 2006

Board Revised:

The Board of Trustees shall adopt high academic standards for student achievement, which challenge all students to reach their full potential and which clarify what students are expected to know and be able to do at each grade level and in each area of study.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide the Board with recommended standards. In developing these recommended standards, the Superintendent or designee shall use a process that involves teachers, school site and District administrators, students, parents/guardians, and community members. He/she shall ensure the alignment of the standards with the District's vision and goals and ensure the proper articulation of standards between grade levels.

District standards for English language arts, English language development, mathematics, science, health education, history-social science, physical education, visual and performing arts, world languages, career technical education, and preschool education shall meet or exceed Statewide model content standards adopted by the State Board of Education or the State Superintendent of Public Instruction as applicable.

Teachers and school administrators shall receive professional development to ensure their understanding of the standards and to discuss effective instructional methods in preparing students to meet the standards.

The Superintendent or designee shall annually communicate the applicable standards to students and their parents/guardians to inform them of the expectations for student learning at their grade level.

Staff shall continually assess students' progress toward meeting the standards, report each student's progress to the student and his/her parents/guardians, and offer remedial assistance in accordance with Board policy and administrative regulation.

District standards shall also provide a basis for evaluating the instructional program, making decisions about curriculum and assessment, and, in accordance with Education Code 44662, evaluating teacher performance.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that District standards are regularly reviewed and updated as necessary. At a minimum, District standards shall be reviewed whenever applicable Statewide standards are revised and whenever data on student achievement demonstrate that students are not adequately achieving the standards in a particular grade level or subject area.

Board Adopted: November 28, 2006

Board Revised:

The Board of Trustees desires to provide a research-based, sequential curriculum, which promotes high levels of student achievement and emphasizes the development of basic skills, problem solving, and decision-making. Upon recommendation of the Superintendent or designee, the Board shall adopt a written District curriculum that describes, for each subject area and grade level, the content objectives which are to be taught in all District schools.

The District's curriculum shall be aligned with the District's vision and goals for student learning, Board policies, academic content standards, State curriculum frameworks, State and District assessments, graduation requirements, school and District improvement plans, and, when necessary, related legal requirements.

The Superintendent or designee shall establish a process for curriculum development, selection, and/or adaptation that utilizes the professional expertise of teachers, principals, and District administrators representing various grade levels, disciplines, special programs, and categories of students as appropriate. The process also may provide opportunities for input from students, parents/guardians, representatives of local businesses and postsecondary institutions, and other community members.

The selection and evaluation of instructional materials shall be coordinated with the curriculum development and evaluation process.

When presenting a recommended curriculum for adoption, the Superintendent or designee shall provide research, data, or other evidence demonstrating the proven effectiveness of the proposed curriculum. He/she also shall present information about the resources that would be necessary to successfully implement the curriculum and describe any modifications or supplementary services that would be needed to make the curriculum accessible to all students.

The Board shall establish a review cycle for regularly evaluating the District's curriculum in order to ensure continued alignment with State and District goals for student achievement. At a minimum, these reviews shall be conducted whenever the State Board of Education adopts new or revised content standards or the curriculum framework for a particular subject or when new law requires a change or addition to the curriculum.

In addition, the Board may require a review of the curriculum in one or more subject areas as needed in response to student assessment results; feedback from teachers, administrators, or parent/guardians; new research on program effectiveness; or changing student needs.

Recognition of Religious Beliefs and Customs

BP 6141.2

Instruction

Board Adopted: November 28, 2006

Board Revised:

The Board of Trustees recognizes that students' education would be incomplete without an understanding of the role of religion in society. As appropriate for a particular course, teachers may objectively discuss the influences of various religions, using religious works and symbols to illustrate their relationship with culture, literature or the arts. The Board expects that such instruction will identify principles common to all religions and foster respect for the diversity of religions and customs in the world.

In order to respect each student's individual right to freedom of religious practice, religious indoctrination is clearly forbidden in the public schools. Instruction about religion shall not promote or denigrate the beliefs or customs of any particular religion or sect, nor should a preference be shown for one religious viewpoint over another. Staff members shall be highly sensitive to their obligation not to interfere with the religious development of any student in whatever tradition the student embraces.

Staff shall not endorse, encourage or solicit religious or anti-religious expression or activities among students during class time. As part of their official duties, staff shall not lead students in prayer or other religious activities. However, staff shall not prohibit or discourage any student from praying or otherwise expressing his/her religious belief as long as this does not disrupt the classroom.

Students may express their beliefs about religion in their homework, artwork and other class work if the expression is germane to the assignment. Such work shall be judged by ordinary academic standards.

While teaching about religious holidays is a permissible part of the educational program, celebrating religious holidays is not allowed in the public schools. School-sponsored programs shall not be, nor have the effect of being, religiously oriented or a religious celebration. School and classroom decorations may express seasonal themes that are not religious in nature.

Music, art, literature or drama programs having religious themes are permitted as part of the curriculum for school-sponsored activities and programs if presented in an objective manner and as a traditional part of the cultural and religious heritage. The use of religious symbols that are part of a religious holiday is permitted as a teaching aid or resource provided that such symbols are displayed as an example of cultural and religious heritage of the holiday and are temporary in nature.

Sexual Health and HIV/AIDS Prevention Instruction

BP 6142.1

Instruction

Board Adopted: November 28, 2006

Board Revised:

The Board of Trustees recognizes that the purpose of the District's sexual health and HIV/AIDS prevention instruction is to provide students with the knowledge and skills necessary to protect them from unintended pregnancy and sexually transmitted diseases and to encourage students to develop healthy attitudes concerning adolescent growth and development, body image, gender roles, sexual orientation, dating, marriage, and family. The Board therefore desires to provide a well-planned sequence of instruction on comprehensive sexual health and HIV/AIDS prevention.

The District's curriculum shall be aligned with the State's content standards, based on medically accurate and factual information, and designed to teach students to make healthy choices and reduce high-risk behaviors. The District's program shall comply with the requirements of law, Board policy, and administrative regulation and shall respect the rights of parents/guardians to supervise their children's education on these subjects and to impart values regarding human sexuality to their children.

The Superintendent or designee may appoint a coordinator and/or an advisory committee regarding the District's comprehensive sexual health program. The advisory committee shall represent a divergence of viewpoints and may participate in planning, implementing, and evaluating the District's comprehensive sexual health education program. The Board shall consider the advisory committee's recommendations when approving the District's program.

Parent/Guardian Consent

A parent/guardian may request in writing that his/her child be excused from participating in HIV/AIDS prevention or sexual health education. Students so excused by their parents/guardians shall be given an alternative educational activity. (Education Code 51240, 51939)

A student shall not be subject to disciplinary action, academic penalty, or other sanction if the student's parent/guardian declines to permit the student to receive the instruction. (Education Code 51939)

BP 6142.3

Instruction Board Adopted:

The Board of Trustees recognizes that citizen involvement in civic and political institutions is essential to a democratic government and desires to provide a comprehensive civic education program to help students acquire the knowledge, skills, and principles essential for informed, responsible citizenship.

The Board shall approve, upon the recommendation of the Superintendent or designee, academic standards and curriculum in civics and government that are aligned with State academic standards and curriculum frameworks.

The Superintendent or designee shall determine specific courses within the K-8 curriculum in which civic education and government may be explicitly and systematically taught. He/she also shall encourage the integration of civic education into other subjects as appropriate.

The District's civic education program shall provide students with an understanding of the rights and responsibilities of citizens in American democracy and the workings of federal, State, and local governments. As appropriate, instruction should include an examination of fundamental American documents, including, but not limited to, the Declaration of Independence, the United States Constitution, the Federalist Papers, and other significant writings and speeches.

To develop a sense of political effectiveness, instruction should develop students' understanding of the importance of civic participation in a democratic society. Service learning, extracurricular and co-curricular activities, class and school elections, and observation of local government processes may be used to reinforce classroom instruction by linking civic knowledge to practical experience and encouraging civic involvement.

Instruction also should promote a student's understanding of shared democratic principles and values, such as personal responsibility, justice, equality, respect for others, civic-mindedness, and patriotism, and enable students to make their own commitment to these civic values.

Constitution/Citizenship Day

Each year on or near September 17, in commemoration of Constitution and Citizenship Day, the District shall hold an educational program for students in grades K-8 pertaining to the United States Constitution that shall include exercises and instruction in the purpose, meaning, and importance of the Constitution, including the Bill of Rights. (Education Code 37221; P.L. 108-447, Sec. 111)

Fullerton School District Board Policy Comprehensive Health Education

BP 6142.8

Instruction Board Adopted:

The Board of Trustees believes that health education should foster the knowledge, skills, and attitudes that students need in order to lead healthy lives and avoid high-risk behaviors. The District's health education program shall be part of a coordinated school health system, which supports the well-being of students and is linked to District and community services and resources.

Goals for the District's health education program shall be designed to promote student wellness and shall include, but not be limited to, goals for nutrition education and physical activity.

The District shall provide a planned, sequential, research-based, and developmentally appropriate health education curriculum for students in grades K-8, which is aligned with the State's content standards and curriculum framework. The Superintendent or designee shall determine the grade levels and subject areas in which health-related topics will be addressed, in accordance with law, Board policy, and administrative regulation.

As appropriate, the Superintendent or designee shall involve school administrators, teachers, school nurses, health professionals representing various fields of health care, parents/guardians, community-based organizations, and other community members in the development, implementation, and evaluation of the District's health education program. Health and safety professionals may be invited to provide related instruction in the classroom, school assemblies, and other instructional settings.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide professional development as needed to ensure that health education teachers are knowledgeable about academic content standards and effective instructional methodologies.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide periodic reports to the Board regarding the implementation and effectiveness of the District's health education program which may include, but not be limited to, a description of the District's program and the extent to which it is aligned with the State's content standards and curriculum framework, the amount of time allotted for health instruction at each grade level, and student achievement of District standards for health education.

Fullerton School District Board Policy Reading Language Arts Instruction

BP 6142.91

Instruction Board Adopted:

The Board of Trustees recognizes that reading and other language arts constitute the basic foundation for learning in other areas of study. Students should develop an appreciation for literature and for reading as a means to acquire knowledge. They also should develop oral and written language skills that enable them to effectively communicate with others.

The Board desires to offer a comprehensive, balanced reading/language arts program that ensures all students have the skills necessary to read fluently and for meaning. The program shall integrate reading, writing, speaking, and listening activities in order to build effective communication skills.

For each grade level, the Board shall adopt academic standards in reading, speaking, and writing, including spelling and grammar that meet or exceed State standards. The District's program also shall be aligned with the State framework for reading/language arts instruction.

Teachers are encouraged to use a variety of instructional strategies to accommodate the needs of beginning readers and the varying abilities of more advanced readers.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide professional development opportunities that are designed to provide instructional staff with knowledge about how students develop language skills, the ability to analyze students' developing literacy, and the ability to draw from a variety of instructional strategies and materials.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that the District's reading/language arts program offers sufficient access to textbooks and other instructional materials of varying levels of difficulty, including fiction and nonfiction works, so that students are continually reading at an appropriate level. In addition, technology should be available to support all areas of literacy.

The Superintendent or designee shall regularly provide the Board with data from State and District reading assessments and program evaluations to enable the Board to monitor program effectiveness.

Grades K-3

The goal of the District's early literacy program shall be to ensure that students are able to read fluently and at grade level by the end of third grade. To reach this goal, the Superintendent or designee shall design a balanced and comprehensive reading/language arts program with the following components:

- 1. Explicit skill development for beginning readers that includes phonemic awareness, phonics and decoding skills, and sufficient practice and repetition of these skills.
- 2. A strong literature, language, and comprehension program that includes a balance of oral and written language.
- 3. Ongoing diagnosis of students' skills.
- 4. An early intervention program that provides assistance to students at risk of reading failure.

Grades 4-8

The Board recognizes that reading/language arts instruction is an integral component of the curriculum at all grade levels. Continuous progress in fluency and comprehension shall be the goal of reading/language arts instruction in grades 4-8.

The program in these grades shall promote reading for subject matter comprehension, developing understanding of progressively more advanced reading material, analyzing and discussing a variety of reading materials, increasing the frequency of reading, developing more complex writing skills with attention to composition and vocabulary, and developing other communications skills.

When students in these grades do not have fully developed reading/language arts skills, the Superintendent or designee shall make resources available to assist them in reaching a reading level sufficient to meet the demands of grade-level material. Staff at all grade levels and in every subject shall take responsibility for supporting and expanding students' literacy skills.

Fullerton School District Board Policy Mathematics Instruction

BP 6142.92

Instruction Board Adopted:

The Board of Trustees desires to offer a rigorous mathematics program that provides a strong foundation in basic mathematical skills and prepares students to apply mathematics in real life. The Superintendent or designee shall develop grade-level curricula that offer a balanced instructional program, including but not limited to:

- 1. Basic mathematical skills: quantification, basic facts, sorting and classification, and computational skills including addition, subtraction, multiplication, division, fractions, decimals, squares and square roots.
- 2. Conceptual understanding: knowledge and application of facts and definitions, identification of principles, understanding of relationships among mathematical concepts, recognition and application of signs, symbols and terms.
- 3. Problem solving: use of mathematical concepts, skills, tools and reasoning strategies to formulate and solve problems in a variety of situations.

The mathematics program shall develop such knowledge and skills in the subject areas of numbers, measurement, geometry, functions, statistics and probability, logic, algebra and discrete mathematics. Students should know, understand and demonstrate concepts through their application to classroom and real-life situations.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that all students have many opportunities to take the full range of mathematics course options.

The Board shall establish specific content and performance standards in mathematical skills, concepts and problem-solving ability for each grade level. Students at risk of failing to meet performance standards shall receive additional assistance and intervention.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that certificated staff have opportunities to participate in professional development activities designed to increase their knowledge and skills in effective mathematics teaching practices.

Students shall have access to sufficient instructional materials, including manipulatives and technology, to support a balanced mathematics program.

BP 6142.93

Instruction Board Adopted:

The Board of Trustees believes that science education should focus on giving students an understanding of key scientific concepts and a capacity for scientific ways of thinking. Students should become familiar with the natural world and the interrelation of science, mathematics and technology. As part of their science instruction, students should learn how to apply scientific knowledge and ways of thinking for individual and social purposes.

As a matter of principle, science teachers are professionally bound to limit their teaching to content that meets the criteria of scientific fact, hypothesis and theory as these terms are used in natural sciences. A scientific fact is an understanding based on confirmable observations and is subject to test and rejection. A scientific hypothesis is an attempt to frame a question as a testable proposition. A scientific theory organizes and explains a range of natural phenomena on the basis of facts and hypotheses. Scientific theories are constantly subject to testing, modification and refutation as new evidence and new ideas emerge.

Philosophical and religious theories are based, at least in part, on faith, and are not subject to scientific test and refutation. Such beliefs shall not be discussed in science classes, but may be addressed in the social science and language arts curricula, as appropriate to grade level standards.

Fullerton School District Board Policy History-Social Science Instruction

BP 6142.94

Instruction Board Adopted:

The Board of Trustees believes that the study of history and other social sciences is essential to prepare students to engage in responsible citizenship, comprehend complex global interrelationships, and understand the vital connections among the past, present, and future. The District's history-social science education program shall be designed to develop students' knowledge of historical events within a chronological and geographic context and shall include, at appropriate grade levels, instruction in American and world history, geography, economics, political science, anthropology, psychology, and sociology.

The Superintendent or designee shall develop a comprehensive, sequential curriculum that is aligned with District standards and is consistent with the State's curriculum framework. At each grade level, the curriculum shall integrate age-appropriate instruction designed to develop student achievement in the following areas:

- 1. Knowledge and cultural understanding, including historical, ethical, cultural, geographic, economic, and sociopolitical literacy.
- 2. Democratic understanding and civic values, including an understanding of national identity; constitutional heritage; and an individual's civic values, rights, and responsibilities.
- 3. Skills attainment and social participation, including basic study skills, critical thinking skills, and participation skills that are essential for effective citizenship.

The District's history-social science curriculum shall include a multicultural education component which is designed to teach students to respect and appreciate cultural diversity and different points of view while also developing their understanding of commonalities and collective experiences. The curriculum shall reflect the experiences of men and women and of various cultural, ethnic, racial, religious, and social groups and their contributions to the history, life, and culture of the local community, California, the United States, and other nations.

The Board shall adopt standards-aligned instructional materials for history-social science in accordance with applicable law, Board policy, and administrative regulation. In addition, teachers are encouraged to supplement the curriculum through the use of biographies, original documents, diaries, letters, legends, speeches, other narrative artifacts, and literature from and about the period being studied.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide a standards-based professional development program designed to increase teachers' knowledge of adopted instructional materials and instructional strategies for teaching history-social science.

The Superintendent or designee shall regularly evaluate test results from the Standardized Testing and Reporting Program at applicable grade levels.

Extracurricular and Co-curricular Activities

BP 6145

Instruction

Board Adopted: November 28, 2006

Board Revised:

The Board of Trustees recognizes that extracurricular and co-curricular activities enrich the educational and social development and experiences of students. The District shall encourage and support student participation in extracurricular and co-curricular activities without compromising the integrity and purpose of the educational program.

No extracurricular or co-curricular program or activity shall be provided or conducted separately, and no District student's participation in extracurricular and co-curricular activities shall be required or refused, based on the student's sex, gender, sexual orientation, ethnic group identification, race, ancestry, national origin, religion, color, or mental or physical disability. Requirements for participation in extracurricular and co-curricular activities shall be limited to those that are essential to the success of the activity. (5 CCR 4925)

Any complaint regarding the District's extracurricular and co-curricular programs or activities shall be filed in accordance with BP/AR 1312.3 - Uniform Complaint Procedures.

No student shall be prohibited from participating in extracurricular and co-curricular activities related to the educational program because of inability to pay fees associated with the activity.

Eligibility Requirements

To be eligible to participate in extracurricular and co-curricular activities, students in grades 7-8 must demonstrate satisfactory educational progress in the previous grading period, including, but not limited to: (Education Code 35160.5)

• Maintenance of a minimum of 2.0 grade point average on a 4.0 scale

The Superintendent or designee may grant ineligible students a probationary period of not more than one semester. Students granted probationary eligibility must meet the required standards by the end of the probationary period in order to remain eligible for participation.

Any decision regarding the eligibility of any child in foster care or a child of a military family for extracurricular or co-curricular activities shall be made by the Superintendent or designee in accordance with Education Code 48850 and 49701.

The Superintendent or designee may revoke a student's eligibility for participation in extracurricular and co-curricular activities when the student's poor citizenship is serious enough to warrant loss of this privilege.

Student Conduct at Extracurricular/Co-curricular Events

When attending or participating in extracurricular and/or co-curricular activities on or off campus, District students are subject to District policies and regulations relating to student conduct. Students who violate District policies and regulations may be subject to discipline including, but not limited to, suspension, expulsion, transfer to alternative programs, or denial of participation in extracurricular or

co-curricular activities in accordance with Board policy and administrative regulation. When appropriate, the Superintendent or designee shall notify local law enforcement.

Nonpublic, Nonsectarian School and Agency Services for Special Education

Instruction Board Adopted:

The Board of Trustees may contract with State-certified nonpublic, nonsectarian schools or agencies to provide special education services or facilities when an appropriate public education program is not available.

When entering into agreements with nonpublic, nonsectarian schools or agencies, the Board shall consider the needs of the individual student and the recommendations of the individualized education program (IEP) team. The IEP team shall remain accountable for monitoring the progress of students placed in nonpublic, nonsectarian programs towards the goals identified in each student's IEP.

Instruction Board Adopted:

In order to protect the rights of students with disabilities, the Superintendent or designee shall appoint a surrogate parent to represent a student with disabilities as necessary in accordance with law. Instruction Board Adopted:

The Board of Trustees recognizes the value of academic research to improve educational programs and practices. Researchers shall respect the privacy rights of students, including their right to refrain from participation in research projects in accordance with law, Board policy and administrative regulation.

The Superintendent or designee may authorize research projects within the District by outside groups or persons when such research is aligned with District goals and objectives and is likely to benefit the District without disrupting the school program.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that parents/guardians receive prior notification of any surveys or evaluations that collect personal student information and that consent is obtained in accordance with law.

Standardized Testing and Reporting Program

Instruction

Board Adopted: November 28, 2006

Board Revised:

The Board of Trustees desires to use the results of achievement tests to evaluate the performance of District students in achieving State academic standards and in comparison to the performance of students across the State. The Superintendent or designee shall administer mandatory student assessments within the State Standardized Testing and Reporting (STAR) Program as required by law and in accordance with Board policy and administrative regulation.

The Board strongly encourages all students at the applicable grade levels to participate in the STAR assessments in order to maximize the usefulness of the data and enable the District to meet participation levels required for State and federal accountability systems. The Superintendent or designee shall notify students and parents/guardians about the importance of these assessments and shall develop strategies to encourage student participation. Students shall be exempted from participation only in accordance with law and administrative regulation.

The Superintendent or designee shall annually present Districtwide STAR results by school, grade level, and student subgroups, to the Board at a regularly scheduled meeting.

Fullerton School District Board Policy Student Use of Technology

BP 6163.4

Instruction

Board Adopted: November 28, 2006

Board Revised:

The Board of Trustees intends that technological resources provided by the District be used in a safe, responsible, and proper manner in support of the instructional program and for the advancement of student learning.

The Superintendent or designee shall notify students and parents/guardians about authorized uses of District computers, user obligations and responsibilities, and consequences for unauthorized use and/or unlawful activities in accordance with District regulations and the District's Acceptable Use Policy.

Before a student is authorized to use the District's technological resources, the student and his/her parent/guardian shall sign and return the Acceptable Use Policy specifying user obligations and responsibilities. In that agreement, the student and his/her parent/guardian shall agree not to hold the District or any District staff responsible for the failure of any technology protection measures, violations of copyright restrictions, or user mistakes or negligence. They shall also agree to indemnify and hold harmless the District and District personnel for any damages or costs incurred.

The Superintendent or designee, with input from students and appropriate staff, shall regularly review and update this policy, the accompanying administrative regulation, and other relevant procedures to enhance the safety and security of students using the District's technological resources and to help ensure that the District adapts to changing technologies and circumstances.

Use of District Computers for Online Services/Internet Access

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that all District computers with Internet access have a technology protection measure that blocks or filters Internet access to visual depictions that are obscene, child pornography, or harmful to minors and that the operation of such measures is enforced. (20 USC 6777, 47 USC 254)

To reinforce these measures, the Superintendent or designee shall implement rules and procedures designed to restrict students' access to harmful or inappropriate matter on the Internet and to ensure that students do not engage in unauthorized or unlawful online activities. Staff shall supervise students while they are using online services and may have teacher aides, student aides, and volunteers assist in this supervision.

The Superintendent or designee also shall establish regulations to address the safety and security of students and student information when using email, chat rooms, and other forms of direct electronic communication.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide age-appropriate instruction regarding safe and appropriate behavior on social networking sites, chat rooms, and other Internet services. Such instruction shall include, but not be limited to, the dangers of posting personal information online, misrepresentation by online predators, how to report inappropriate or offensive content or threats, behaviors that constitute cyberbullying, how to respond when subjected to cyberbullying, and how to ensure that intellectual property, copyright, and fair use are observed for educational projects. Student use of District computers to access unauthorized social networking sites is prohibited. To the extent possible, the Superintendent or designee shall block access to such sites on District computers

with Internet access. Appropriate social networking and Web 2.0 sites that are a benefit to instructional purposes will be allowed as the District sees fit.

Identification and Evaluation of Individuals for Special Education

BP 6164.4

Instruction Board Adopted:

The Board of Trustees recognizes the need to actively seek out and evaluate District residents from birth to age 21 who have disabilities in order to provide them with appropriate educational opportunities in accordance with State and federal law.

The Superintendent or designee in cooperation with Special Education Local Plan Area (SELPA) procedures shall develop processes to determine when an individual is eligible for special education services and shall establish systematic procedures for special education program identification, screening, referral, assessment, planning, implementation, review, and triennial assessment. (Education Code 56301)

The Superintendent or designee in cooperation with SELPA procedures shall establish a method whereby parents/guardians, teachers, appropriate professionals, and others may refer an individual for assessment for special education services. Identification procedures shall be coordinated with school site procedures for referral of students with needs that cannot be met with modifications to the regular instructional program. (Education Code 56302)

The Superintendent or designee shall notify parents/guardians, in writing, of their rights related to identification, referral, assessment, instructional planning, implementation, and review, including the District's procedures for initiating a referral for assessment to identify individuals who need special education services. (Education Code 56301)

Board Policy

Children With Disabilities Enrolled By Their Parents in Private School

BP 6164.41

Instruction Board Adopted:

The Board of Trustees recognizes its obligations under federal and State law to identify and provide equitable services to children voluntarily enrolled by their parents/guardians in private schools located within the District.

The Superintendent or designee in cooperation with the Special Education Local Plan Area (SELPA) shall ensure that activities to locate, identify, and evaluate children with disabilities enrolled by their parents/guardians in private schools within the District are comparable to activities undertaken for individuals with disabilities aged three to 22 in public schools within the District. (34 CFR 300.131; Education Code 56171)

The SELPA shall develop a budget for the provision of services to children with disabilities enrolled by their parents in private school based on the proportionate share of federal funds received and the number of eligible children, including the possibility of mid-year enrollees, and the types of services to be provided.

Fullerton School District Board Policy Supplemental Instruction

BP 6179

Instruction Board Adopted:

The Board of Trustees recognizes that high-quality supplemental instructional programs can motivate and support students to attain grade-level academic standards, overcome academic deficiencies, and/or acquire critical skills.

Required Supplemental Programs

The District shall offer direct, systematic, and intensive supplemental instruction for:

- 1. Students in grades 2-8 who have been retained or recommended for retention pursuant to Education Code 48070.5. (Education Code 37252.2)
- 2. Students in grades 7-8 who do not demonstrate "sufficient progress" toward passing the State Exit Examination required for high school graduation in order to help them pass the exam. (Education Code 37252, 60851)

"Sufficient progress" shall be determined based on a student's grades and the following indicators of academic achievement:

- District benchmark assessments
- California Standard Test (CST) results

Optional Supplemental Programs

As funding, facilities, and staffing permit, supplemental instruction may be offered to:

- 1. Students in grades 2-6 who have been identified as being "at risk" of retention pursuant to Education Code 48070.5. (Education Code 37252.8)
- 2. Students in grades 2-6 who have been identified as having a deficiency in mathematics, reading, or written expression based on the results of the Standardized Testing and Reporting Program. (Education Code 37252.8)
- 3. Students in grades K-8 who seek enrichment in mathematics, science, or other core academic areas designated by the Superintendent of Public Instruction. (Education Code 37253)
- 4. Students in grades K-4 who need or desire intensive reading opportunities that meet standards for a research-based comprehensive reading program, including appropriate support to address the needs of English language learners. (Education Code 41505-41508)
- 5. Students in grades 7-8 who need or desire intensive opportunities to practice skills in algebra and/or pre-algebra. (Education Code 41505-41508)

Required Student Participation

The Superintendent or designee may require participation in a supplemental instructional program for: (Education Code 37252.2, 37254.1)

- 1. Students in grades 7-8 who demonstrate insufficient progress toward the exit exam required for high school graduation pursuant to Education Code 37252
- 2. Students in grades 2-8 who are retained or recommended for retention pursuant to Education Code 37252.2
- 3. Students in grades 2-6 who are "at risk" of retention pursuant to Education Code 37252.8

The Superintendent or designee shall obtain written parent/guardian consent for a student's participation in the supplemental instructional program.
