<u>NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED</u> that the Board of Trustees of the Fullerton School District hereby delegates to the District Superintendent and the Assistant Superintendent of Business Services for the period of July 1, 2010 through June 30, 2011 the power to sign and enter into Child Care and Development Services contracts and agreements with the State of California and to sign application documents relative to Child Care and Development Services funding.

The contractor's signature also certifies compliance with "Standard Provisions for State Contracts", (Exhibit A) which by this reference is incorporated herein.

Funding of this contract is contingent upon appropriation and availability of funds. This contract may be terminated immediately by the State if funds are not appropriated or available in amounts sufficient to fund the State's obligations under this contract. The period of performance for this contract is July 01, 2010 through June 30, 2011. The total amount payable pursuant to this agreement shall not exceed \$15,000.00.

Expenditure of these funds shall be reported quarterly to the Child Development Fiscal Services (CDFS) on form CDFS-9529. Reporting must be submitted for reimbursement of expenditures. For non-local educational agencies, expenditures made for the period July 1, 2010 through June 30, 2011 shall be included in their fiscal year 2010-11 audit due by the 15th day of the fifth month following the end of the contractor's fiscal year or earlier if specified by CDE. The audits for School Districts and County Offices shall be submitted in accordance with Education Code Section 41020.

Any provision of this contract found to be in violation of Federal or State statute or regulation shall be invalid but such a finding shall not affect the remaining provisions of this contract.

TECHROOM responds in a timely manner and keeps District school site meal systems and department equipment running efficiently.
<u>Rationale:</u>	Nutrition Services is fully-integrated and networked with computer systems operating at all school sites and central offices. TECHROOM's monthly support calls will maintain department computer hardware, software, and data in optimal operating condition. TECHROOM services have been valuable in preventing major repairs and down-time during the critical meal service periods. Additionally, TECHROOM is knowledgeable about the Schoolhouse software systems used by the department and has been able to save time and money by promptly troubleshooting and repairing Nutrition Services' technology through remote access. This service includes unlimited monthly service hours to be performed during Nutrition Services' regular business hours.

Agreement for Professional Services •

August 3, 2010

1. **Parties**. This Agreement for Professional Services (this "*Agreement*") is entered into between the following parties:

SERVICE PROVIDER: Name: TechRoom, Inc. ("*TechRoom*") TechRoom Location: TechRoom Costa Mesa Address: 1835 Newport Blvd. A-106 Costa Mesa California 92627 Customer Service Telephone Number: (949) 706-5852

CLIENT: Name: Fullerton School District, Nutrition Sevices Department ("*Client*") Mailing Address: 1401 W. Valencia Drive Fullerton CA 92833 Telephone Number: (714) 447-7435

2. **Term of Contract.** This Agreement shall commence on August 30, 2010 (the "*Start Date*") and shall continue in force for a period of twelve (12) months unless terminated sooner as provided in Paragraph 16 of this Agreement.

3. **Services Provided**. TechRoom shall provide to Client during the term of this Agreement the following services ("*Services*"):

(a) A written assessment of Client's IT objectives (the Client's "*IT Plan*"). For initial service engagements, a prerequisite initial I.T. operations assessment is required separate from this agreement.

(b) Monthly and quarterly analysis and monitoring of the performance of Client's IT System as compared to performance levels and criteria identified in the IT Plan.

(c) Response for unplanned failures of the Covered Hardware and software according to service plan level selected by Client (see Paragraph 10).

(d) Hardware and software problem resolution ("*Repairs*"), including carry-in repairs and onsite repairs, for Covered Equipment when not covered by manufacturer warranty ("*Out of Warranty*"). Please note that parts, shipping, handling and other fees are not included and payable separate from this agreement.

(e) Installation of software patches and bug fixes, including firmware and device driver updates, as appropriate based on the IT Plan and for customer-owned and licensed software.

Service provided which is beyond the Services described above ("*Special Projects*") will be separately documented and billed and payable as mutually agreed.

TechRoom proposes to deliver the Services by way of both on-site and remote access. TechRoom will in all cases determine the most appropriate means of service delivery. Client agrees to purchase remote access software recommended by TechRoom for all covered equipment. Fees required for software, licenses and subscriptions required, if any, for remote access are the responsibility of Client and will be due upon approval of this Agreement. Client will own any and all software and licenses purchases for remote access.

4. **Excluded Services**. TechRoom is available to respond to all problems and outages. Not covered in the scope of this Agreement, but are available on an emergency basis at TechRoom current rates, are services to repair or correct the following ("*Excluded Services*"):

(a) Service interruptions caused by intentional or accidental damage to Covered Equipment or software.

(b) Service interruptions resulting from earthquake, fire, flood, electrical surges or failures, or similar events and hazards and service interruptions caused by Client's Internet service provider ("*ISP*").

(c) Service interruptions resulting from use of the Covered Equipment other than in connection with the Client's normal business operations.

(d) Service interruptions resulting from misuse or lack of proper care by the Client or the Client's employees.

(e) Service interruptions resulting from acts of vandalism.

(f) Service interruptions resulting from the Client's failure to maintain TechRoom recommended virus, firewall and similar protections.

Service time for Excluded Services will be billed at TechRoom's then normal hourly rates and be in addition to Services provided under this Agreement. Additional time spent for Excluded Services is payable within ten (10) days of invoice and if not paid is subject to the same late penalty as described in paragraph 9 below. The normal billing rate in effective as of the date of this Agreement is \$225 per hour for work performed during regular business hours (see Paragraph 11 below) and \$300 per hour for work performed after regular business hours. Such rates are subject to change at any time. The cost for replacement parts and new or updated software licenses is not included in this Agreement and will be billed to the Client. TechRoom reserves the right to require prior payment for any order for replacement parts and new or updated software licenses of \$500.

5. Scheduled Visits. TechRoom will schedule regular visits to Client during which times routine and regular hardware support and software maintenance will be performed in accordance with the Client's schedule to ensure no or minimal interruption of IT services. Please refer to Exhibit B (the "Service Schedule") attached for the initial onsite service schedule, which is subject to change based on mutual agreement by Client and TechRoom. TechRoom and its employees agree to access the Client's premises during Client's normal operating hours from Client-specified entrances and exits, unless otherwise agreed upon in writing.

6. Client's Obligations.

(a) Client agrees to exercise proper care in the use and handling of the Covered Equipment, including following the manufacturer's recommended guidelines regarding the proper use and care of the Covered Equipment.

(b) Client agrees to maintain a detailed written log of all equipment and software failures which log shall be made available to TechRoom during service calls.

(c) Client is responsible for making all management decisions and performing all management functions. Client should designate a competent employee as a primary administrative contact for services TechRoom provides. Client is responsible for evaluating the adequacy and results of such services. Client is also responsible for maintaining internal controls, including monitoring ongoing activities.

(d) Client shall provide a workspace for TechRoom's technicians while at the Client's site during the course of each service engagement. The workspace will be used for the purpose of providing Services under the terms and conditions set forth in this Agreement. In addition, Client will provide at no additional expense to TechRoom during the course of service, electricity, lights, air-conditioning and high-speed Internet access.

(e) Client shall make available to TechRoom loading access (or other temporary parking) to permit quick drop-off and pickup of equipment or related transactions with TechRoom. For the purposes of this Section, such loading access or other temporary parking shall permit parking for at least ten (10) minutes and no longer than twenty (20) minutes. In the event that such parking and loading access is unavailable to the Client, Client agrees to reimburse TechRoom for costs associated with delivery of equipment and goods, including loading and unloading, parking and

other transportation costs when such parking and loading is required in the course of service and approved by Client.

7. **Description of Covered Equipment**. TechRoom shall provide technical Services as described in Paragraph 3 above for the equipment described on the attached <u>Exhibit A</u> (the "*Covered Equipment*") for the period and on the terms and conditions set forth in this Agreement and for any replacements of such equipment. Additions to the equipment described in <u>Attachment A</u> may be added as additional Covered Equipment only by writing signed and acknowledged by TechRoom.

8. **Cost and Payment for Service**. We base our fees on the value of the services provided to you. Our billing will be on a monthly basis in an agreed amount of \$2700.00 per month payable each month plus the cost of any additional service level cost selected by Client (see Paragraph 9 below), commencing with the date of August 30, 2010 and each month thereafter for the term of this Agreement. **Payment for Services is due on the first day of each month**. Payments not received within ten (10) days of when due are subject to a per month late payment fee of 1.5% of the amount not paid. If any payment is has not been received within fifteen (15) days of when due, TechRoom may, at its option, suspend further Services until the account is completely current. Our fees are subject to annual adjustments effective April 1 of each year.

While it is not anticipated, our fees may also be evaluated for adjustment when significant or material business changes occur, including but not limited to:

- (a) Increase or decrease in workforce
- (b) Increase or decrease in the complexity of the I.T. system
- (c) Increase or decrease in the integrity of the I.T. system

Any and all adjustments will be communicated to client with 90 days written notice.

9. **Service Level.** This Agreement covers the Standard Service level described below. By checking one option below, Client may elect a higher service level for specific guaranteed availability and response time that exceeds the Standard Service level. Cost for such higher service levels must be paid in addition to and concurrently with the cost of service described in Paragraph 9 above.

TechRoom strives to respond to all service calls as quickly as possible. However, depending on the service level selected, priority will be give to insure response within the time frames described for the service level selected. Please initial one service level below. If no option is initialed, the standard service priority will apply:

<u>Standard Service (included):</u> Same day response for calls received by 10:00AM and by 9:00AM the next business day for calls received after 10:00AM. Three (3) day return-to-service goal. Service level cost: *Included in standard problem prevention plans*

<u>Priority Service Option 1:</u> initial to approve option 1: _____ Four (4) hour onsite response during client regular operating hours. Two (2) business day return-to-service goal. Service level cost: \$3,000 per month in addition to regular Services Compensation

<u>Priority Service Option 2:</u> initial to approve option 2: _____ Two (2) hour onsite response during client regular operating hours. One (1) business day return-to-service goal. Service level cost: \$4,500 per month in addition to regular Services Compensation

<u>Priority Service Option 3:</u> initial to approve option 3: _____ Two (2) hour onsite response during client regular operating hours. One (1) business day return-to-service goal. Four (4) hour onsite response outside of client regular operating hours. Service level cost: \$9,000 per month in addition to regular Services Compensation 10. **Regular Business Hours**. TechRoom's regular business hours ("*Business Hours*") are Monday through Friday 9:00 am to 5:00 pm, excluding holidays.

Please note that TechRoom's carry-in service center hours may exceed standard business operating hours. If you require special hours of operations please notify your account manager and you will be provided with alternative service hours and associated costs if applicable.

11. **Procedure to Obtain Unscheduled Service**. To obtain service for an unexpected interruption in IT Facilities (hardware or software), calls should be directed to your local TechRoom during regular Business Hours. The call will be directed to the appropriate TechRoom technician who will then provide a timetable for response.

12. **Excusable Delays and Failures**. TechRoom shall not be responsible for any delay or failure in its performance under this Agreement caused by events beyond the reasonable control of TechRoom, including, but not limited to, terrorism, war, riots, labor strikes, interruption of utility services, fires, floods, earthquakes, and other natural disasters.

13. **No Agency.** In no event, and under no circumstances, shall Client and TechRoom be deemed to be an associate, affiliate, joint venture or partner of the other, unless specifically agreed in writing. Unless previously expressly approved in writing by Client, TechRoom shall not hold or maintain itself to be and associate, affiliate, joint-venture or partner of Client, nor shall TechRoom use, either as a fictitious, trade or style name, the name of Client in its business, promotion, marketing or advertising, without Client's prior written consent.

14. **Limitation of Liability**. Neither TechRoom nor any of its directors, officers or employees shall be liable for any consequential or incidental damages related to services provided under this Agreement including but not limited to loss of data.

15. **Non-Solicitation of Employees.** Both TechRoom and Client agree not to solicit, hire, employ, and/or enter into any contract with the current or former employees of the other during the term of the Agreement and for a period of one (1) year after the termination of this Agreement. The parties agree that if either party breaches this provision of the Agreement, it will be difficult to quantify the exact amount of damages, given the variable and unique nature of the respective party's employees' skills, experience, and familiarity with its proprietary information. Accordingly, the parties agree that if either party breaches this provision of the Agreement, the non-breaching party may apply for injunctive relief, including without limitation, a temporary restraining order-prohibiting breaching party from engaging in such activities.

16. **Right to Cancel**. After the expiration of ninety (90) days following the execution of this Agreement, either party may, upon ninety (90) days written notice, terminate this Agreement with or without cause. All costs for service to the date of cancellation will be prorated.

17. **Insurance.** TechRoom shall obtain and maintain during the duration of this Agreement the following insurance against claims for injuries to persons or damage to property that may arise from or in connection with TechRoom's performance of this Agreement:

(a) Commercial General Liability Insurance with a combined single limit of \$1,000,000 for each occurrence and a \$2,000,000 aggregate limit. This insurance will be considered primary and no other insurance shall be considered contributory or co-insurance.

(b) Commercial Automobile Liability Insurance covering TechRoom's owned and rented vehicles with a minimum of \$1,000,000 combined single limit per occurrence for bodily injury and property damage.

(c) Worker's Compensation Insurance in compliance with the laws of the State of California and Employer's Liability Insurance in an amount not less than \$1,000,000 per claimant.

At Client's request, TechRoom will provide Client with certificates of insurance evidencing the insurance coverage described above.

18. **Electronic Information Security**. TechRoom may during the course of providing the Services be exposed to sensitive information, including passwords and access to privileged information. Client information systems and information contained therein will be treated as confidential

19. **Transferability.** Client's rights under this Agreement may not be transferred other than with the written consent of TechRoom and any transfer without such consent shall be void.

20. **Incorporation of Prior Agreement; Amendments.** This Agreement and any exhibits attached hereto constitute the complete agreement of the parties with respect to the subject matters referred to herein and supersede all prior or contemporaneous negotiations, promises, commitments, covenants or agreements of every kind or nature whatsoever with respect thereto, all of which have become merged and finally integrated into this Agreement and, to the extent not included herein, are hereby released, waived and relinquished. No covenants, agreements, understandings, representations or warranties of any kind whatsoever have been made by any party hereto, except as specifically set forth in this Agreement. No amendment, modification or waiver of any provision of this Agreement shall in any event be effective unless the same shall be in writing and signed by all parties and then such waiver or consent shall be effective only in the specific instance and for the specific purpose for which it is given.

21. **Governing Law.** This Agreement and the rights and obligations of the parties hereto shall be governed by and construed for all purposes in accordance with the laws of the State of California without regard for conflict of law principles.

22. **Arbitration.** Any controversy arising out of the subject matter of this Agreement shall be settled by arbitration by and pursuant to the then current rules and regulations of Judicate West. Such arbitration shall be held in Orange County, California and the decision shall be binding for all purposes and may be entered in any court of competent jurisdiction. The cost of arbitration shall be divided equally between the parties.

23. **Costs and Attorney's Fees.** In the event legal action (including arbitration) is commenced to enforce or interpret any part of this Agreement, the prevailing party shall be entitled to recover as an element of its cost of suit its reasonable attorneys' fees as determined by the arbitrator or court.

24. **Captions**. The section headings, underscoring and sequence herein are for convenience only and shall not in any way affect the meaning or construction of any provision hereof.

- SUBJECT: APPROVE INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR AGREEMENT BETWEEN FULLERTON SCHOOL DISTRICT AND *RACHEL'S CHALLENGE* TO PROVIDE TRAINING THAT WILL INSPIRE, EQUIP, AND EMPOWER STUDENTS TO FIGHT SOCIAL AGGRESSION, HARASSMENT, BULLYING, AND VIOLENCE ON SEPTEMBER 9, 2010 AT LADERA VISTA JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOL
- Background: Powerful video/audio footage of Rachel's life and the Columbine tragedy holds students spell-bound during a one hour school presentation that motivates them to positive change in the way they treat others. Her acts of kindness and compassion coupled with the contents of her six diaries have become the foundation for one of the most life-changing school programs in America.

This is followed by an interactive 45-minute training session involving both adult and student leaders that shows how to sustain the momentum created by the assembly. The assembly creates the "want to" or desire for positive change. The training session teaches the "how to" and ensures that the positive impact will continue.

That evening the Rachel's Challenge speaker conducts a powerful session with parents and community leaders. This session is similar to the assembly program and ends with a specific challenge to parents and community leaders, showing them how they can reinforce the decisions their youth are making. Entertainers, politicians, sports celebrities, educators, and even two Presidents of the United States have been impacted by Rachel's Challenge. However, students are the target audience and they have proven that they will respond with positive words, attitudes, and actions.

A copy of the contract is available in the Superintendent's office for review.

- Rationale: This internationally recognized program consists of training that will provide students with social/emotional education that celebrates diversity, is culturally relevant, and reinforces resiliency skills. It also has lasting impact as the "Chain Link" Club based on these trainings seeks to embed compassion for others into the school culture. This program will give our students the motivation and knowledge to make a positive impact in each other, reduce school violence, reduce incidents of bullying, and foster a positive learning environment.
- <u>Funding</u>: Total cost is not to exceed \$2,300.00 to be paid by ASB funds.
- <u>Recommendation</u>: Approve Independent Contractor Agreement between Fullerton School District and *Rachel's Challenge* to provide training that will inspire, equip, and empower students to fight social aggression, harassment, bullying, and violence on September 9, 2010 at Ladera Vista Junior High School.

AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT is made and entered into this <u>24th</u> day of <u>August</u> 2010, by and between the Trustees of **BIOLA UNIVERSITY, INC.**, La Mirada, California, hereinafter referred to as "SCHOOL", and <u>Fullerton School District</u> located in <u>Fullerton, California</u>, which hereinafter will be referred to as "AGENCY".

PART I: BASIS AND PURPOSE OF AGREEMENT

WITNESSETH

WHEREAS, the SCHOOL provides accredited nursing education which requires clinical experiences for students enrolled in the program.

WHEREAS, the AGENCY has facilities suitable for the clinical needs of the SCHOOL'S program in nursing.

WHEREAS, it is to the benefit of both the SCHOOL and AGENCY that nursing students have opportunities for clinical experience to enhance their capabilities as practitioners.

NOW, THEREFORE, the SCHOOL and AGENCY do covenant and agree as follows:

PART II: GENERAL RESPONSIBILITIES AND PRIVILEGES OF THE SCHOOL

The SCHOOL shall agree:

- 1. To assume full responsibility for offering nursing education accredited by both the State Board and the Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education.
- 2. To abide by existing policies of the AGENCY.
- 3. To save and hold AGENCY harmless against any legal claims, demands or judgments against AGENCY arising out of any activities performed by SCHOOL'S students or instructors performing activities pursuant to this agreement.
- 4. To go through established channels in making plans for practicum and/or observational learning experiences for students.
- 5. To assume the responsibility for the development, organization and implementation of the curriculum under the direction of a qualified instructional staff.

- 6. To assume the responsibility for supervision of students and instruction required in each program, except in such instances as may otherwise be specifically and formally planned and arranged. Student/instructor ratio, 10:1.
- 7. To assure that SCHOOL faculty and nursing students are covered by malpractice and health insurance.
- 8. To provide opportunity for SCHOOL faculty members to be oriented to AGENCY before students come to facility.
- 9. To provide orientation for students to AGENCY.
- 10. There will be no monetary obligations between SCHOOL and AGENCY to each other or to any student or by the AGENCY to any instructor participating therein.
- 11. That each student will have had a complete yearly physical examination and required immunizations.
- 12. To ensure that all students maintain the confidentiality of any and all health care recipients and other information received in the course of the program and to ensure that students do not discuss, transmit, or narrate in any form any person's information of a personal nature, medical or otherwise, except as is a necessary part of the person's care.
- 13. To provide Workers' Compensation Insurance on students during clinical assignment and keep records of clinical attendance.

PART III: GENERAL RESPONSIBILITIES AND PRIVILEGES OF THE AGENCY

The AGENCY agrees:

1. To provide facilities as presently available and as necessary to the development and maintenance of sound educational experience for students in the Nursing Program.

- 2. To provide the cooperation and counsel of its staff in the conduct of the program. The AGENCY staff may participate in the educational program on request of the SCHOOL representative. They may serve as resource persons, clinical experts, and/or preceptors; they also may assist in the planning and implementation of aspects of clinical education. Such participation shall be voluntary and shall not interfere with assigned agency duties.
- 3. To save and hold SCHOOL harmless against any legal claims, demands or judgments against AGENCY arising out of any activities performed by AGENCY employees performing activities pursuant to this agreement.
- 4. To provide opportunities for students to have experiences in giving and/or observing services to clients.
- 5. To arrange the use of a conference room, if needed, when available.
- 6. To arrange parking facilities for students and instructors while in the AGENCY to the same extent as for AGENCY employees.
- 7. Upon request, to permit the Board of Registered Nursing, the Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education, and/or the Department of Nursing to make site visits to the facilities.

PART IV: STATUS OF STUDENT NURSES

- 1. Student Nurses shall have the status of learners and shall not be considered to be AGENCY employees, nor shall they replace AGENCY staff. Clinical experience will be conducted as a laboratory learning experience and is provided on an "extended campus" basis. There shall be no monetary obligation between AGENCY and SCHOOL or its students and instructors.
- 2. Student Nurses are subject to the authority, policies and regulations of the SCHOOL. They are also subject, during clinical assignment, to applicable AGENCY regulations and must conform to the same standards as are set for AGENCY employees in matters relating to the welfare of people and general AGENCY operations including maintaining confidentiality.

PART V: MUTUAL RESPONSIBILITIES

1. A student may be removed from an AGENCY practicum experience either by the SCHOOL or at the request of the AGENCY following mutual review by SCHOOL and AGENCY.

- 2. This agreement shall continue in effect for an indefinite period of time subject to termination by either party at the end of a school year by the giving of one semester advance written notice to the other party.
- 3. The agreement will be reviewed periodically and revised as needed.
- 4. Appropriate staff of the SCHOOL and the AGENCY will meet for scheduled conferences periodically.
- 5. The clinical area to be used must be approved by the AGENCY and the SCHOOL.
- 6. Neither party shall employ discriminatory practices in its performance, hereunder, including its employment practices on the basis of race, color, sex, national origin or ancestry.
- 7. The administrator has power to give and receive notice on behalf of the AGENCY under the agreement. The SCHOOL Board of Trustees or its authorized representative shall have power to give and receive notice on behalf of the SCHOOL.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the AGENCY has caused this Agreement to be subscribed by its administrator and the SCHOOL has caused this Agreement to be signed in its behalf by its duly authorized officer, as of the day, month, and the year first above written.

Enrollment projections can be quickly calculated based on existing or modified school attendance boundaries, and the projections take into account local and federal census data to provide the most accurate results. The web-based geographic information system allows for multiple concurrent users and provides access to the tools for examining the unlimited numbers of scenarios in studying attendance areas.

The DecisionInsite system also provides community members an easy-to-use tool for verifying their school according to street address. This system is more accurate and convenient than the database used prior to contracting with DecisionInsite.

- Rationale:The District requires boundary studies and attendance projections.
DecisionInsite provides this service with informative detail. The boundary tool

- <u>Background:</u> Fullerton School District has utilized a variety of online learning management systems (LMS) for teachers and students over the past decade. Learning mangement systems provide a repository for ideas, discussion, resources, and assessment in a "hybrid" style.

For several years, the District utilized CTAP Online through Butte County Office of Education. At a cost between \$10.00-\$15.00 per license, it was an expensive service only used by teachers.

In the last three years, the District has utilized Angel LMS through the Orange County Department of Education for teachers and students. In the past two years, the cost has about tripled from \$1.50 per license. With the recent purchase of Angel by BlackBoard, the cost and features of Angel is still unclear and may not be decided upon for months.

- Rationale:In 2009/2010, the District began piloting the Haiku LMS to determine whether
it could meet the needs for CTAP Certification and hybrid learning
environments. Haiku is a relatively new company that is lower in cost but
offers more innovative features for online environments. It was utilized with
teachers and students in classrooms with laptops and iPod touch devices.
This year, the plan is to continue expanding the system as a resource that will
be available to all teachers and some pilot classes. By entering into a contract
with Haiku by August 31, 2010 the District will lock-in a price of \$3.80 per

In general, PBIS emphasizes four integrated elements: (a) data for decision making, (b) measurable outcomes supported and evaluated by data, (c) practices with evidence that these outcomes are achievable, and (d) systems that efficiently and effectively support implementation of these practices.

- Rationale: Golden Hill, Maple, Sunset Lane, and Ladera Vista Junior High School will benefit from PBIS trainings offered as a result of the grant award through a competitive process offered to Orange County schools. School teams will be selected comprised of teachers, support staff, and site administrator to participate in the trainings and to redesign their student behavior systems. The PBIS tiered behavior system complements the Response to Intervention (RtI) pyramid, which is already implemented into FSD schools.
- Funding:District is to receive from OCDE an allocation of \$8,500.00 per school (Golden
Hill, Maple, Sunset Lane, and Ladera Vista) not to exceed \$34,000.00.

Fullerton School District Board Policy School Plans/Site Councils

BP 0420

Philosophy, Goals, Objectives and Comprehensive Plans Board Adopted: August 23, 2005 Board Revised:

When required by law or determined to be a useful tool to accomplish District and school goals, school site councils or other school advisory groups shall develop comprehensive school plans designed to enhance student achievement at individual school sites.

Single Plan for Student Achievement

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that a Single Plan for Student Achievement is prepared by the school site council as required by law for each school participating in specified state and/or federal categorical programs. (Education Code 41507, 41572, 52055.755, 64001)

Whenever **applicable**, any other school plan, **District goals and objectives** may be incorporated into the Single Plan for Student Achievement.

The Superintendent or designee shall review each school's single plan and ensure that it has been developed and approved by a properly constituted school site council, meets the content requirements for all programs included, is based on an analysis of current practices and student academic performance, and reasonably links improvement strategies to identified needs of the school and students. He/she shall submit to the Board of Trustees his/her recommendations for plan approval or recommendations regarding any subsequent material revisions of the plan.

The Board shall review and approve each school's Single Plan for Student Achievement at a regularly scheduled meeting. The Board also shall review and approve any subsequent revisions that include material changes affecting the academic programs for students participating in these categorical programs. The Board shall certify that, to the extent allowable under federal law, the plan is consistent with District local improvement plans required as a condition of receiving federal funding. (Education Code 64001)

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that principals and members of each site council receive training on the roles and responsibilities of the site council. To the extent necessary, he/she shall ensure that site councils receive the resources necessary in order to perform their role effectively.

School Site Categorical Block Grants

Upon receipt of State funding for school site block grants, the Board shall allocate the funds to District schools on an equal per-pupil basis. (AB 1802, Sec. 43, Statutes of 2006)

The school's use of the funds allocated through this block grant shall be proposed by the school site council or, if the school does not have a school site council, by a schoolwide advisory group or school support group. (AB 1802, Sec. 43, Statutes of 2006)

The Board encourages school site councils to fund the highest priority needs identified in school improvement plans. The school site council shall provide the Superintendent or designee and the Board with a written proposal that includes a statement of the identified need(s) and how the funds will be used to enhance the educational program.

Before the funds are encumbered or expended, the Board shall approve the site council's proposed use of the funds. If the Board does not approve the proposed use, the Board shall inform the school site council of the reasons for disapproval and request that the council review and revise its proposal. (AB 1802, Sec. 43, Statutes of 2006)

Philosophy, Goals, Objectives and Comprehensive Plans Board Adopted:

The Board of Trustees recognizes its responsibility to inform parents/guardians and the community about the conditions, needs, and progress at each District school and to provide data by which parents/guardians can make meaningful comparisons between schools. The process of gathering and analyzing data also provides opportunities for school and District staff to review achievements and identify areas for improvement.

The Board shall annually issue a School Accountability Report Card (SARC) for each school site. (Education Code 35256)

In preparing the District's report cards, the Superintendent or designee may choose to use or adapt the model template provided by the California Department of Education. If the model template is not used, the Superintendent or designee shall ensure that data are reported in a manner that is consistent with the definitions for school conditions as provided in the template. At least every three years, the Board shall compare the content of the District's report cards to the State's model template, recognizing that variances are allowed by law as necessary to meet local needs. (Education Code 33126.1, 35256)

The Board shall annually approve the SARCs for all District schools and shall evaluate the data contained in the SARCs as part of the Board's regular review of the effectiveness of the District's programs, personnel, and fiscal operations.

The Superintendent or designee shall develop strategies for communicating the information contained in the SARCs to all stakeholders, including opportunities for staff and the community to discuss their content.

Notification and Dissemination of SARCs

The Superintendent or designee shall annually publicize the issuance of the SARCs and notify parents/guardians that a paper copy will be provided upon request. On or before February 1st of each year, the Superintendent or designee shall make the SARCs available in paper copy and on the Internet. (Education Code 35256)

Philosophy, Goals, Objectives and Comprehensive Plans Board Adopted:

The Board of Trustees is committed to enabling all District students to meet State academic achievement standards and to narrowing the achievement gap among student groups. To that end, the Board shall assist all District schools, including those receiving federal Title I funds, to achieve adequate yearly progress, as defined by the State Board of Education.

Whenever a District school is identified by the California Department of Education as in need of program improvement (PI), the Superintendent or designee shall ensure that school improvement efforts are coordinated and aligned. He/she shall also revise the school's Single Plan for Student Achievement in accordance with law and as specified in administrative regulation.

Depending on the length of time a District school has been identified for PI, the District shall provide opportunities for student transfers, supplemental educational services, other corrective actions, and/or restructuring in accordance with law.

Program Evaluation

The Board shall annually review the adequate yearly progress of each District school based on State academic assessments and other indicators specified in the State plan for the No Child Left Behind Act. The Superintendent or designee shall publicize and disseminate the results of this review to parents/guardians, principals, schools, and the community so that the instructional program can be continually refined to help all students meet State academic standards. (20 USC 6316)

As necessary based on the results of these evaluations, the Board may require the Superintendent or designee to review and revise any of the school's reform plans, including the school's Single Plan for Student Achievement, allocate additional resources toward the implementation of the plan, and/or require more frequent monitoring of the school's progress in order to raise student achievement.

In the event that the District is identified for Program Improvement (PI) by the California Department of Education (CDE), the Superintendent or designee shall, in accordance with law and administrative regulation, notify parents/guardians, administer a District self-assessment process, and revise the LEA plan. (20 USC 6316; Education Code 52055.57)

The revised LEA plan or plan addendum shall be approved by the Board and submitted to the CDE. The Superintendent or designee shall annually report to the Board regarding the implementation of the plan during Years 1 and 2 of the program.

The Superintendent or designee shall utilize available State and local resources to identify specific problems contributing to low student achievement and provide technical assistance and support to resolve those problems. He/she also shall work closely with individual school sites to raise student achievement in accordance with school plans.

Year 3 PI: Corrective Action

If the District does not make AYP after two years of receiving program funding, the Board shall cooperate with the Superintendent of Public Instruction (SPI) and the SBE in the identification and implementation of appropriate corrective actions.

The Board shall enter into a contract with a District Assistance and Intervention Team (DAIT) whenever the SPI and SBE determine this to be the most appropriate corrective action. Upon receiving a report of recommendations from the DAIT: (Education Code 52055.57, 52059)

- 1. The Board may, not later than 30 days after completion of the report, appeal to the SPI to be exempted from implementing one or more of the report's recommendations.
- 2. Not later than 60 days after completion of the report, the Board shall, at a regularly scheduled meeting, adopt the report recommendations, as modified by any exemptions granted by the SPI.

The Superintendent or designee shall establish a District leadership team to collaborate with the DAIT in the development and implementation of an action plan to address high-priority needs. This team may include site and District administrators, teacher leaders, special education teachers, English learner experts, fiscal officers, and other key personnel, as appropriate.

The Superintendent or designee shall monitor the District's progress in implementing the DAIT's recommendations and shall continually use student performance data to determine whether additional District or school site changes are necessary to improve student achievement.

BP 0520.4

Philosophy, Goals, Objectives and Comprehensive Plans Board Adopted:

The Board of Trustees believes that schools demonstrating the lowest performance on State indicators of student achievement should be assisted with additional resources and support focused on instructional improvement and student services. Such schools also need working conditions and learning environments that will attract and retain well-qualified teachers, administrators, and other staff. The Board desires to help such schools address their complex educational needs and achieve their annual growth targets.

Whenever the Superintendent of Public Instruction identifies a District school as ranking in decile 1 or 2 on the Academic Performance Index (API) and notifies the District that the school is eligible to participate in the State's Quality Education Investment program, the Board shall determine whether applying for this funding will help improve academic achievement at that school. The Superintendent or designee shall review the program requirements and recommend to the Board if it would be in the District's best interest to apply to use alternative program requirements that would provide for a higher level of academic achievement. Based on this determination, the Board may submit an application, including an application for an alternative program, on behalf of the school in order to obtain additional State funding for school improvement.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that each participating school uses program funds for the purposes expressed in law and administrative regulation. Activities carried out under this program shall be aligned with other school improvement efforts.

The Superintendent or designee shall monitor the progress of participating schools to evaluate the effectiveness of school efforts in increasing student achievement, as measured by the API and other indicators, increasing student attendance, and, for secondary schools, increasing graduation rates. If the Superintendent or designee determines that sufficient progress is not being made at a particular school, the Superintendent or designee shall determine what types of additional District resources and support should be provided to the school so that progress in increasing student achievement can be made.

Fullerton School District Board Policy Complaints Concerning Instructional Materials

BP 1312.2

Community Relations Board Adopted: January 27, 1987 Board Revised:

The Board of Trustees uses a comprehensive process to adopt District instructional materials that is based on selection criteria established by law and Board policy and includes opportunities for the involvement of parents/guardians and community members. Complaints concerning the content or use of instructional materials, including textbooks, supplementary instructional materials, library materials, or other instructional materials and equipment, shall be properly and fairly considered using established complaint procedures.

Parents/guardians are encouraged to discuss any concerns regarding instructional materials with their child's teacher and/or the school principal. If the situation remains unresolved, a complaint may be filed using the process specified in the administrative regulation.

The District shall accept complaints concerning instructional materials only from staff, District residents, or the parents/guardians of children enrolled in a District school.

When deliberating upon challenged materials, the Superintendent or designee and/or review committee shall consider the educational philosophy of the District, the professional opinions of teachers of the subject and of other competent authorities, reviews of the materials by reputable bodies, the teacher's stated objectives in using the materials, community standards, and the objections of the complainant.

The Superintendent or designee will have the final decision concerning instructional materials.

The District's decision shall be based on educational suitability of the materials and the criteria established in Board policy and administrative regulation.

When any challenged instructional material is reviewed by the District, it shall not be subject to further reconsideration for 12 months, unless the Superintendent or designee determines that reconsideration is warranted.

Complaints related to sufficiency of textbooks or instructional materials shall be resolved pursuant to the District's Williams Uniform Complaint Procedures.

Fullerton School District Board Policy Employee Use of Technology

Personnel Board Adopted: September 9, 2008 Board Revised:

The Board of Trustees recognizes that technological resources can enhance employee performance by offering effective tools to assist in providing a quality instructional program, facilitating communications with parents/guardians, students, and the community, supporting District and school operations, and improving access to and exchange of information. The Board expects all employees to learn to use the available technological resources that will assist them in the performance of their job responsibilities. As needed, employees shall receive professional development in the appropriate use of these resources.

Employees shall be responsible for the appropriate use of technology and shall use the District's technological resources primarily for purposes related to their employment.

Employees shall be notified that computer files and electronic communications, including email and voice mail, are not private. Technological resources shall not be used to transmit confidential information about students, employees, or District operations without authority.

Online/Internet Services

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that all District computers with Internet access have a technology protection measure that prevents access to visual depictions that are obscene or child pornography and that the operation of such measures is enforced. The Superintendent or designee may disable the technology protection measure during use by an adult to enable access for bona fide research or other lawful purpose. (20 USC 6777; 47 USC 254)

To ensure proper use, the Superintendent or designee may monitor employee usage of technological resources, including the accessing of email and stored files. Monitoring may occur at any time without advance notice or consent. When passwords are used, they must be known to the Superintendent or designee so that he/she may have system access.

The Superintendent or designee shall establish administrative regulations and an Acceptable Use Agreement, which outline employee obligations and responsibilities related to the use of District technology. He/she also may establish guidelines and limits on the use of technological resources. Inappropriate use may result in a cancellation of the employee's user privileges, disciplinary action, and/or legal action in accordance with law, Board policy, and administrative regulation.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide copies of related policies, regulations, and guidelines to all employees who use the District's technological resources. Employees shall be required to acknowledge in writing that they have read and understood the District's Acceptable Use Agreement.

Use of Cellular Phone or Mobile Communications Device

An employee shall not use a cellular phone or other mobile communications device for personal business while on duty, except in emergency situations and/or during scheduled work breaks.

Any employee that uses a cell phone or mobile communications device in violation of law, Board policy, or administrative regulation shall be subject to discipline and may be referred to law enforcement officials as appropriate.

Fullerton School District Board Policy Academic Standards

Instruction Board Adopted: November 28, 2006 Board Revised:

The Board of Trustees shall adopt high academic standards for student achievement, which challenge all students to reach their full potential and which clarify what students are expected to know and be able to do at each grade level and in each area of study.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide the Board with recommended standards. In developing these recommended standards, the Superintendent or designee shall use a process that involves teachers, school site and District administrators, students, parents/guardians, and community members. He/she shall ensure the alignment of the standards with the District's vision and goals and ensure the proper articulation of standards between grade levels.

District standards for English language arts, English language development, mathematics, science, health education, history-social science, physical education, visual and performing arts, world languages, career technical education, and preschool education shall meet or exceed Statewide model content standards adopted by the State Board of Education or the State Superintendent of Public Instruction as applicable.

Teachers and school administrators shall receive professional development to ensure their understanding of the standards and to discuss effective instructional methods in preparing students to meet the standards.

The Superintendent or designee shall annually communicate the applicable standards to students and their parents/guardians to inform them of the expectations for student learning at their grade level.

Staff shall continually assess students' progress toward meeting the standards, report each student's progress to the student and his/her parents/guardians, and offer remedial assistance in accordance with Board policy and administrative regulation.

District standards shall also provide a basis for evaluating the instructional program, making decisions about curriculum and assessment, and, in accordance with Education Code 44662, evaluating teacher performance.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that District standards are regularly reviewed and updated as necessary. At a minimum, District standards shall be reviewed whenever applicable Statewide standards are revised and whenever data on student achievement demonstrate that students are not adequately achieving the standards in a particular grade level or subject area.

Fullerton School District Board Policy School Day

The Board of Trustees shall fix the length of the school day subject to the provisions of the law. (Education Code 46100)

The Superintendent or designee shall schedule class periods giving consideration to course requirements and curricular demands, availability of school facilities, the age and attention span of students, and legal requirements.

The Board encourages flexibility in scheduling so as to provide longer time blocks or class periods when appropriate and desirable to support student learning, provide more intensive study of core academic subjects or extended exploration of complex topics, and reduce transition time between classes.

Fullerton School District Board Policy Curriculum Development and Evaluation

Instruction Board Adopted: November 28, 2006 Board Revised:

The Board of Trustees desires to provide a research-based, sequential curriculum, which promotes high levels of student achievement and emphasizes the development of basic skills, problem solving, and decision-making. Upon recommendation of the Superintendent or designee, the Board shall adopt a written District curriculum that describes, for each subject area and grade level, the content objectives which are to be taught in all District schools.

The District's curriculum shall be aligned with the District's vision and goals for student learning, Board policies, academic content standards, State curriculum frameworks, State and District assessments, graduation requirements, school and District improvement plans, and, when necessary, related legal requirements.

The Superintendent or designee shall establish a process for curriculum development, selection, and/or adaptation that utilizes the professional expertise of teachers, principals, and District administrators representing various grade levels, disciplines, special programs, and categories of students as appropriate. The process also may provide opportunities for input from students, parents/guardians, representatives of local businesses and postsecondary institutions, and other community members.

The selection and evaluation of instructional materials shall be coordinated with the curriculum development and evaluation process.

When presenting a recommended curriculum for adoption, the Superintendent or designee shall provide research, data, or other evidence demonstrating the proven effectiveness of the proposed curriculum. He/she also shall present information about the resources that would be necessary to successfully implement the curriculum and describe any modifications or supplementary services that would be needed to make the curriculum accessible to all students.

The Board shall establish a review cycle for regularly evaluating the District's curriculum in order to ensure continued alignment with State and District goals for student achievement. At a minimum, these reviews shall be conducted whenever the State Board of Education adopts new or revised content standards or the curriculum framework for a particular subject or when new law requires a change or addition to the curriculum.

In addition, the Board may require a review of the curriculum in one or more subject areas as needed in response to student assessment results; feedback from teachers, administrators, or parent/guardians; new research on program effectiveness; or changing student needs.

Fullerton School District Board Policy Recognition of Religious Beliefs and Customs

BP 6141.2

Instruction Board Adopted: November 28, 2006 Board Revised:

The Board of Trustees recognizes that students' education would be incomplete without an understanding of the role of religion in society. As appropriate for a particular course, teachers may objectively discuss the influences of various religions, using religious works and symbols to illustrate their relationship with culture, literature or the arts. The Board expects that such instruction will identify principles common to all religions and foster respect for the diversity of religions and customs in the world.

In order to respect each student's individual right to freedom of religious practice, religious indoctrination is clearly forbidden in the public schools. Instruction about religion shall not promote or denigrate the beliefs or customs of any particular religion or sect, nor should a preference be shown for one religious viewpoint over another. Staff members shall be highly sensitive to their obligation not to interfere with the religious development of any student in whatever tradition the student embraces.

Staff shall not endorse, encourage or solicit religious or anti-religious expression or activities among students during class time. As part of their official duties, staff shall not lead students in prayer or other religious activities. However, staff shall not prohibit or discourage any student from praying or otherwise expressing his/her religious belief as long as this does not disrupt the classroom.

Students may express their beliefs about religion in their homework, artwork and other class work if the expression is germane to the assignment. Such work shall be judged by ordinary academic standards.

While teaching about religious holidays is a permissible part of the educational program, celebrating religious holidays is not allowed in the public schools. School-sponsored programs shall not be, nor have the effect of being, religiously oriented or a religious celebration. School and classroom decorations may express seasonal themes that are not religious in nature.

Music, art, literature or drama programs having religious themes are permitted as part of the curriculum for school-sponsored activities and programs if presented in an objective manner and as a traditional part of the cultural and religious heritage. The use of religious symbols that are part of a religious holiday is permitted as a teaching aid or resource provided that such symbols are displayed as an example of cultural and religious heritage of the holiday and are temporary in nature.

Fullerton School District Board Policy Sexual Health and HIV/AIDS Prevention Instruction

BP 6142.1

Instruction Board Adopted: November 28, 2006 Board Revised:

The Board of Trustees recognizes that the purpose of the District's sexual health and HIV/AIDS prevention instruction is to provide students with the knowledge and skills necessary to protect them from unintended pregnancy and sexually transmitted diseases and to encourage students to develop healthy attitudes concerning adolescent growth and development, body image, gender roles, sexual orientation, dating, marriage, and family. The Board therefore desires to provide a well-planned sequence of instruction on comprehensive sexual health and HIV/AIDS prevention.

The District's curriculum shall be aligned with the State's content standards, based on medically accurate and factual information, and designed to teach students to make healthy choices and reduce high-risk behaviors. The District's program shall comply with the requirements of law, Board policy, and administrative regulation and shall respect the rights of parents/guardians to supervise their children's education on these subjects and to impart values regarding human sexuality to their children.

The Superintendent or designee may appoint a coordinator and/or an advisory committee regarding the District's comprehensive sexual health program. The advisory committee shall represent a divergence of viewpoints and may participate in planning, implementing, and evaluating the District's comprehensive sexual health education program. The Board shall consider the advisory committee's recommendations when approving the District's program.

Parent/Guardian Consent

A parent/guardian may request in writing that his/her child be excused from participating in HIV/AIDS prevention or sexual health education. Students so excused by their parents/guardians shall be given an alternative educational activity. (Education Code 51240, 51939)

A student shall not be subject to disciplinary action, academic penalty, or other sanction if the student's parent/guardian declines to permit the student to receive the instruction. (Education Code 51939)

Fullerton School District Board Policy Civic Education

BP 6142.3

Instruction Board Adopted:

The Board of Trustees recognizes that citizen involvement in civic and political institutions is essential to a democratic government and desires to provide a comprehensive civic education program to help students acquire the knowledge, skills, and principles essential for informed, responsible citizenship.

The Board shall approve, upon the recommendation of the Superintendent or designee, academic standards and curriculum in civics and government that are aligned with State academic standards and curriculum frameworks.

The Superintendent or designee shall determine specific courses within the K-8 curriculum in which civic education and government may be explicitly and systematically taught. He/she also shall encourage the integration of civic education into other subjects as appropriate.

The District's civic education program shall provide students with an understanding of the rights and responsibilities of citizens in American democracy and the workings of federal, State, and local governments. As appropriate, instruction should include an examination of fundamental American documents, including, but not limited to, the Declaration of Independence, the United States Constitution, the Federalist Papers, and other significant writings and speeches.

To develop a sense of political effectiveness, instruction should develop students' understanding of the importance of civic participation in a democratic society. Service learning, extracurricular and cocurricular activities, class and school elections, and observation of local government processes may be used to reinforce classroom instruction by linking civic knowledge to practical experience and encouraging civic involvement.

Instruction also should promote a student's understanding of shared democratic principles and values, such as personal responsibility, justice, equality, respect for others, civic-mindedness, and patriotism, and enable students to make their own commitment to these civic values.

Constitution/Citizenship Day

Each year on or near September 17, in commemoration of Constitution and Citizenship Day, the District shall hold an educational program for students in grades K-8 pertaining to the United States Constitution that shall include exercises and instruction in the purpose, meaning, and importance of the Constitution, including the Bill of Rights. Fullerton School District Board Policy Comprehensive Health Education

Instruction Board Adopted:

The Board of Trustees believes that health education should foster the knowledge, skills, and attitudes that students need in order to lead healthy lives and avoid high-risk behaviors. The District's health education program shall be part of a coordinated school health system, which supports the well-being of students and is linked to District and community services and resources.

Goals for the District's health education program shall be designed to promote student wellness and shall include, but not be limited to, goals for nutrition education and physical activity.

The District shall provide a planned, sequential, research-based, and developmentally appropriate health education curriculum for students in grades K-8, which is aligned with the State's content standards and curriculum framework. The Superintendent or designee shall determine the grade levels and subject areas in which health-related topics will be addressed, in accordance with law, Board policy, and administrative regulation.

As appropriate, the Superintendent or designee shall involve school administrators, teachers, school nurses, health professionals representing various fields of health care, parents/guardians, communitybased organizations, and other community members in the development, implementation, and evaluation of the District's health education program. Health and safety professionals may be invited to provide related instruction in the classroom, school assemblies, and other instructional settings.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide professional development as needed to ensure that health education teachers are knowledgeable about academic content standards and effective instructional methodologies.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide periodic reports to the Board regarding the implementation and effectiveness of the District's health education program which may include, but not be limited to, a description of the District's program and the extent to which it is aligned with the State's content standards and curriculum framework, the amount of time allotted for health instruction at each grade level, and student achievement of District standards for health education.

Fullerton School District Board Policy Reading Language Arts Instruction

Instruction Board Adopted:

The Board of Trustees recognizes that reading and other language arts constitute the basic foundation for learning in other areas of study. Students should develop an appreciation for literature and for reading as a means to acquire knowledge. They also should develop oral and written language skills that enable them to effectively communicate with others.

The Board desires to offer a comprehensive, balanced reading/language arts program that ensures all students have the skills necessary to read fluently and for meaning. The program shall integrate reading, writing, speaking, and listening activities in order to build effective communication skills.

For each grade level, the Board shall adopt academic standards in reading, speaking, and writing, including spelling and grammar that meet or exceed State standards. The District's program also shall be aligned with the State framework for reading/language arts instruction.

Teachers are encouraged to use a variety of instructional strategies to accommodate the needs of beginning readers and the varying abilities of more advanced readers.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide professional development opportunities that are designed to provide instructional staff with knowledge about how students develop language skills, the ability to analyze students' developing literacy, and the ability to draw from a variety of instructional strategies and materials.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that the District's reading/language arts program offers sufficient access to textbooks and other instructional materials of varying levels of difficulty, including fiction and nonfiction works, so that students are continually reading at an appropriate level. In addition, technology should be available to support all areas of literacy.

The Superintendent or designee shall regularly provide the Board with data from State and District reading assessments and program evaluations to enable the Board to monitor program effectiveness.

Grades K-3

The goal of the District's early literacy program shall be to ensure that students are able to read fluently and at grade level by the end of third grade. To reach this goal, the Superintendent or designee shall design a balanced and comprehensive reading/language arts program with the following components:

- 1. Explicit skill development for beginning readers that includes phonemic awareness, phonics and decoding skills, and sufficient practice and repetition of these skills.
- 2. A strong literature, language, and comprehension program that includes a balance of oral and written language.
- 3. Ongoing diagnosis of students' skills.
- 4. An early intervention program that provides assistance to students at risk of reading failure.

Grades 4-8

The Board recognizes that reading/language arts instruction is an integral component of the curriculum at all grade levels. Continuous progress in fluency and comprehension shall be the goal of reading/language arts instruction in grades 4-8.

The program in these grades shall promote reading for subject matter comprehension, developing understanding of progressively more advanced reading material, analyzing and discussing a variety of reading materials, increasing the frequency of reading, developing more complex writing skills with attention to composition and vocabulary, and developing other communications skills.

When students in these grades do not have fully developed reading/language arts skills, the Superintendent or designee shall make resources available to assist them in reaching a reading level sufficient to meet the demands of grade-level material. Staff at all grade levels and in every subject shall take responsibility for supporting and expanding students' literacy skills.

Fullerton School District Board Policy Mathematics Instruction

BP 6142.92

Instruction Board Adopted:

The Board of Trustees desires to offer a rigorous mathematics program that provides a strong foundation in basic mathematical skills and prepares students to apply mathematics in real life. The Superintendent or designee shall develop grade-level curricula that offer a balanced instructional program, including but not limited to:

- 1. Basic mathematical skills: quantification, basic facts, sorting and classification, and computational skills including addition, subtraction, multiplication, division, fractions, decimals, squares and square roots.
- 2. Conceptual understanding: knowledge and application of facts and definitions, identification of principles, understanding of relationships among mathematical concepts, recognition and application of signs, symbols and terms.
- 3. Problem solving: use of mathematical concepts, skills, tools and reasoning strategies to formulate and solve problems in a variety of situations.

The mathematics program shall develop such knowledge and skills in the subject areas of numbers, measurement, geometry, functions, statistics and probability, logic, algebra and discrete mathematics. Students should know, understand and demonstrate concepts through their application to classroom and real-life situations.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that all students have many opportunities to take the full range of mathematics course options.

The Board shall establish specific content and performance standards in mathematical skills, concepts and problem-solving ability for each grade level. Students at risk of failing to meet performance standards shall receive additional assistance and intervention.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that certificated staff have opportunities to participate in professional development activities designed to increase their knowledge and skills in effective mathematics teaching practices.

Students shall have access to sufficient instructional materials, including manipulatives and technology, to support a balanced mathematics program.

Fullerton School District Board Policy Science Instruction

BP 6142.93

Instruction Board Adopted:

The Board of Trustees believes that science education should focus on giving students an understanding of key scientific concepts and a capacity for scientific ways of thinking. Students should become familiar with the natural world and the interrelation of science, mathematics and technology. As part of their science instruction, students should learn how to apply scientific knowledge and ways of thinking for individual and social purposes.

As a matter of principle, science teachers are professionally bound to limit their teaching to content that meets the criteria of scientific fact, hypothesis and theory as these terms are used in natural sciences. A scientific fact is an understanding based on confirmable observations and is subject to test and rejection. A scientific hypothesis is an attempt to frame a question as a testable proposition. A scientific theory organizes and explains a range of natural phenomena on the basis of facts and hypotheses. Scientific theories are constantly subject to testing, modification and refutation as new evidence and new ideas emerge.

Philosophical and religious theories are based, at least in part, on faith, and are not subject to scientific test and refutation. Such beliefs shall not be discussed in science classes, but may be addressed in the social science and language arts curricula, as appropriate to grade level standards.

Fullerton School District Board Policy History-Social Science Instruction

The Board of Trustees believes that the study of history and other social sciences is essential to prepare students to engage in responsible citizenship, comprehend complex global interrelationships, and understand the vital connections among the past, present, and future. The District's history-social science education program shall be designed to develop students' knowledge of historical events within a chronological and geographic context and shall include, at appropriate grade levels, instruction in American and world history, geography, economics, political science, anthropology, psychology, and sociology.

The Superintendent or designee shall develop a comprehensive, sequential curriculum that is aligned with District standards and is consistent with the State's curriculum framework. At each grade level, the curriculum shall integrate age-appropriate instruction designed to develop student achievement in the following areas:

- 1. Knowledge and cultural understanding, including historical, ethical, cultural, geographic, economic, and sociopolitical literacy.
- 2. Democratic understanding and civic values, including an understanding of national identity; constitutional heritage; and an individual's civic values, rights, and responsibilities.
- 3. Skills attainment and social participation, including basic study skills, critical thinking skills, and participation skills that are essential for effective citizenship.

The District's history-social science curriculum shall include a multicultural education component which is designed to teach students to respect and appreciate cultural diversity and different points of view while also developing their understanding of commonalities and collective experiences. The curriculum shall reflect the experiences of men and women and of various cultural, ethnic, racial, religious, and social groups and their contributions to the history, life, and culture of the local community, California, the United States, and other nations.

The Board shall adopt standards-aligned instructional materials for history-social science in accordance with applicable law, Board policy, and administrative regulation. In addition, teachers are encouraged to supplement the curriculum through the use of biographies, original documents, diaries, letters, legends, speeches, other narrative artifacts, and literature from and about the period being studied.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide a standards-based professional development program designed to increase teachers' knowledge of adopted instructional materials and instructional strategies for teaching history-social science.

The Superintendent or designee shall regularly evaluate test results from the Standardized Testing and Reporting Program at applicable grade levels.

Fullerton School District Board Policy Extracurricular and Co-curricular Activities

Instruction Board Adopted: November 28, 2006 Board Revised:

The Board of Trustees recognizes that extracurricular and co-curricular activities enrich the educational and social development and experiences of students. The District shall encourage and support student participation in extracurricular and co-curricular activities without compromising the integrity and purpose of the educational program.

No extracurricular or co-curricular program or activity shall be provided or conducted separately, and no District student's participation in extracurricular and co-curricular activities shall be required or refused, based on the student's sex, gender, sexual orientation, ethnic group identification, race, ancestry, national origin, religion, color, or mental or physical disability. Requirements for participation in extracurricular activities shall be limited to those that are essential to the success of the activity. (5 CCR 4925)

Any complaint regarding the District's extracurricular and co-curricular programs or activities shall be filed in accordance with BP/AR 1312.3 - Uniform Complaint Procedures.

No student shall be prohibited from participating in extracurricular and co-curricular activities related to the educational program because of inability to pay fees associated with the activity.

Eligibility Requirements

To be eligible to participate in extracurricular and co-curricular activities, students in grades 7-8 must demonstrate satisfactory educational progress in the previous grading period, including, but not limited to: (Education Code 35160.5)

• Maintenance of a minimum of 2.0 grade point average on a 4.0 scale

The Superintendent or designee may grant ineligible students a probationary period of not more than one semester. Students granted probationary eligibility must meet the required standards by the end of the probationary period in order to remain eligible for participation.

Any decision regarding the eligibility of any child in foster care or a child of a military family for extracurricular or co-curricular activities shall be made by the Superintendent or designee in accordance with Education Code 48850 and 49701.

The Superintendent or designee may revoke a student's eligibility for participation in extracurricular and co-curricular activities when the student's poor citizenship is serious enough to warrant loss of this privilege.

Student Conduct at Extracurricular/Co-curricular Events

When attending or participating in extracurricular and/or co-curricular activities on or off campus, District students are subject to District policies and regulations relating to student conduct. Students who violate District policies and regulations may be subject to discipline including, but not limited to, suspension, expulsion, transfer to alternative programs, or denial of participation in extracurricular or co-curricular activities in accordance with Board policy and administrative regulation. When appropriate, the Superintendent or designee shall notify local law enforcement.

Fullerton School District Board Policy Nonpublic, Nonsectarian School and Agency Services for Special Education

BP 6159.2

Instruction Board Adopted:

The Board of Trustees may contract with State-certified nonpublic, nonsectarian schools or agencies to provide special education services or facilities when an appropriate public education program is not available.

When entering into agreements with nonpublic, nonsectarian schools or agencies, the Board shall consider the needs of the individual student and the recommendations of the individualized education program (IEP) team. The IEP team shall remain accountable for monitoring the progress of students placed in nonpublic, nonsectarian programs towards the goals identified in each student's IEP.

The Board of Trustees desires to use the results of achievement tests to evaluate the performance of District students in achieving State academic standards and in comparison to the performance of students across the State. The Superintendent or designee shall administer mandatory student assessments within the State Standardized Testing and Reporting (STAR) Program as required by law and in accordance with Board policy and administrative regulation.

The Board strongly encourages all students at the applicable grade levels to participate in the STAR assessments in order to maximize the usefulness of the data and enable the District to meet participation levels required for State and federal accountability systems. The Superintendent or designee shall notify students and parents/guardians about the importance of these assessments and shall develop strategies to encourage student participation. Students shall be exempted from participation only in accordance with law and administrative regulation.

The Superintendent or designee shall annually present Districtwide STAR results by school, grade level, and student subgroups, to the Board at a regularly scheduled meeting.

Fullerton School District Board Policy Student Use of Technology

Instruction Board Adopted: November 28, 2006 Board Revised:

The Board of Trustees intends that technological resources provided by the District be used in a safe, responsible, and proper manner in support of the instructional program and for the advancement of student learning.

The Superintendent or designee shall notify students and parents/guardians about authorized uses of District computers, user obligations and responsibilities, and consequences for unauthorized use and/or unlawful activities in accordance with District regulations and the District's Acceptable Use Policy.

Before a student is authorized to use the District's technological resources, the student and his/her parent/guardian shall sign and return the Acceptable Use Policy specifying user obligations and responsibilities. In that agreement, the student and his/her parent/guardian shall agree not to hold the District or any District staff responsible for the failure of any technology protection measures, violations of copyright restrictions, or user mistakes or negligence. They shall also agree to indemnify and hold harmless the District and District personnel for any damages or costs incurred.

The Superintendent or designee, with input from students and appropriate staff, shall regularly review and update this policy, the accompanying administrative regulation, and other relevant procedures to enhance the safety and security of students using the District's technological resources and to help ensure that the District adapts to changing technologies and circumstances.

Use of District Computers for Online Services/Internet Access

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that all District computers with Internet access have a technology protection measure that blocks or filters Internet access to visual depictions that are obscene, child pornography, or harmful to minors and that the operation of such measures is enforced. (20 USC 6777, 47 USC 254)

To reinforce these measures, the Superintendent or designee shall implement rules and procedures designed to restrict students' access to harmful or inappropriate matter on the Internet and to ensure that students do not engage in unauthorized or unlawful online activities. Staff shall supervise students while they are using online services and may have teacher aides, student aides, and volunteers assist in this supervision.

The Superintendent or designee also shall establish regulations to address the safety and security of students and student information when using email, chat rooms, and other forms of direct electronic communication.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide age-appropriate instruction regarding safe and appropriate behavior on social networking sites, chat rooms, and other Internet services. Such instruction shall include, but not be limited to, the dangers of posting personal information online, misrepresentation by online predators, how to report inappropriate or offensive content or threats, behaviors that constitute cyberbullying, how to respond when subjected to cyberbullying, and how to ensure that intellectual property, copyright, and fair use are observed for educational projects. Student use of District computers to access unauthorized social networking sites is prohibited. To the extent possible, the Superintendent or designee shall block access to such sites on District computers

with Internet access. Appropriate social networking and Web 2.0 sites that are a benefit to instructional purposes will be allowed as the District sees fit.

Instruction Board Adopted:

The Board of Trustees recognizes the need to actively seek out and evaluate District residents from birth to age 21 who have disabilities in order to provide them with appropriate educational opportunities in accordance with State and federal law.

The Superintendent or designee in cooperation with Special Education Local Plan Area (SELPA) procedures shall develop processes to determine when an individual is eligible for special education services and shall establish systematic procedures for special education program identification, screening, referral, assessment, planning, implementation, review, and triennial assessment. (Education Code 56301)

The Superintendent or designee in cooperation with SELPA procedures shall establish a method whereby parents/guardians, teachers, appropriate professionals, and others may refer an individual for assessment for special education services. Identification procedures shall be coordinated with school site procedures for referral of students with needs that cannot be met with modifications to the regular instructional program. (Education Code 56302)

The Superintendent or designee shall notify parents/guardians, in writing, of their rights related to identification, referral, assessment, instructional planning, implementation, and review, including the District's procedures for initiating a referral for assessment to identify individuals who need special education services. (Education Code 56301)

Fullerton School District Board Policy Children With Disabilities Enrolled By Their Parents in Private School

BP 6164.41

Instruction Board Adopted:

The Board of Trustees recognizes its obligations under federal and State law to identify and provide equitable services to children voluntarily enrolled by their parents/guardians in private schools located within the District.

The Superintendent or designee in cooperation with the Special Education Local Plan Area (SELPA) shall ensure that activities to locate, identify, and evaluate children with disabilities enrolled by their parents/guardians in private schools within the District are comparable to activities undertaken for individuals with disabilities aged three to 22 in public schools within the District. (34 CFR 300.131; Education Code 56171)

The SELPA shall develop a budget for the provision of services to children with disabilities enrolled by their parents in private school based on the proportionate share of federal funds received and the number of eligible children, including the possibility of mid-year enrollees, and the types of services to be provided.

Fullerton School District Board Policy Supplemental Instruction

Instruction Board Adopted:

The Board of Trustees recognizes that high-quality supplemental instructional programs can motivate and support students to attain grade-level academic standards, overcome academic deficiencies, and/or acquire critical skills.

Required Supplemental Programs

The District shall offer direct, systematic, and intensive supplemental instruction for:

- 1. Students in grades 2-8 who have been retained or recommended for retention pursuant to Education Code 48070.5. (Education Code 37252.2)
- Students in grades 7-8 who do not demonstrate "sufficient progress" toward passing the State Exit Examination required for high school graduation in order to help them pass the exam. (Education Code 37252, 60851)

"Sufficient progress" shall be determined based on a student's grades and the following indicators of academic achievement:

- District benchmark assessments
- California Standard Test (CST) results

Optional Supplemental Programs

As funding, facilities, and staffing permit, supplemental instruction may be offered to:

- 1. Students in grades 2-6 who have been identified as being "at risk" of retention pursuant to Education Code 48070.5. (Education Code 37252.8)
- 2. Students in grades 2-6 who have been identified as having a deficiency in mathematics, reading, or written expression based on the results of the Standardized Testing and Reporting Program. (Education Code 37252.8)
- 3. Students in grades K-8 who seek enrichment in mathematics, science, or other core academic areas designated by the Superintendent of Public Instruction. (Education Code 37253)
- 4. Students in grades K-4 who need or desire intensive reading opportunities that meet standards for a research-based comprehensive reading program, including appropriate support to address the needs of English language learners. (Education Code 41505-41508)
- 5. Students in grades 7-8 who need or desire intensive opportunities to practice skills in algebra and/or pre-algebra. (Education Code 41505-41508)
- 6. District Saturday School programs.

BP 6179

Required Student Participation

The Superintendent or designee may require participation in a supplemental instructional program for: (Education Code 37252.2, 37254.1)

- 1. Students in grades 7-8 who demonstrate insufficient progress toward the exit exam required for high school graduation pursuant to Education Code 37252
- 2. Students in grades 2-8 who are retained or recommended for retention pursuant to Education Code 37252.2
- 3. Students in grades 2-6 who are "at risk" of retention pursuant to Education Code 37252.8

The Superintendent or designee shall obtain written parent/guardian consent for a student's participation in the supplemental instructional program.

SUBJECT: APPROVE TENTATIVE AGREEMENT 2010/2011 REOPENER BETWEEN FULLERTON SCHOOL DISTRICT AND CALIFORNIA STATE EMPLOYEES ASSOCIATION (CSEA) #130

- Background: The Board of Trustees takes action to approve agreements between the District and its various associations. The information provided in this document summarizes the financial implications of the proposed agreement and is submitted to the Board of Trustees for public disclosure of the major provisions of the agreement (as provided in the "Public Disclosure of Proposed Bargaining Agreement") in accordance with the requirements of AB 1200 and Government Code Section 3547.5.
- Rationale: The current agreement between the Board of Trustees and CSEA expired on June 30, 2010. A tentative agreement for 2010/2011 has been reached between the District and CSEA and now must be formally ratified by the Board of Trustees.

Funding: Not applicable.

<u>Recommendation:</u> Approve tentative agreement 2010/2011 reopener between Fullerton School District and California State Employees Association (CSEA) #130.

1. The parties agree that CSEA's "fair share" of concession necessary to keep the District fiscally solvent in fiscal year (FY) 2010-2011 is 3.58% in total compensation (calculated on base salary). The parties agree that unit members shall take a three percent (3%) salary reduction through utilization of eight (8) furlough days for 12 month employees, seven (7) furlough days for 10 - 11 month employees and six (6) furlough days for less than 10 month employees in order for Fullerton School District to gain fiscal solvency. The parties agree that the cost of one percent for CSEA's bargaining unit is approximately \$180,000.

The following days shall be furlough days for 9.5 to 9.75 month employees: November 1, 2010; November 12, 2010; January 28, 2011; March 18, 2011; May 27, 2011; June 6, 2011. For 10 to 11 month employees, November 24, 2010 shall be added. For 12-month employees, April 14, 2011 shall be added. Furlough days may be adjusted for individual employees or classifications based upon needs of the District.

a. Furlough days shall not reduce the accrual of sick leave, holidays, or vacation during any pay period in which furlough days are taken as Education Code allows.

b. The reduction of 3% compensation will be equally distributed through an employee's work calendar so no more than the value of one furlough day is extracted in any given month.

c. The 3% reduction in compensation is determined to be in effect for the fiscal year 2010-2011 only. The furlough days sunset on June 30, 2011.

d. The use of the term "furlough days" for this agreement relates to a reduction in workdays approximately proportionate to the reduction of pay in an employee's salary over the work year.

e. The District agrees not to layoff or reduce hours of unit members during the 2010-11 fiscal year subject to the occurrence of one or more of the following exceptions:

- The layoff Resolution 09-10-21 approved by the Board on June 29, 2010
- Reduction or elimination of grant and/ or categorically funded programs
- Reduction or elimination of any district and/or site based funds
- Demonstrated changes in district service needs and /or budget priorities as determined by the Board of Trustees, Foundation Boards, or site councils
- Changes that negatively impact the District's federal or state revenue or cash
 flow levels

2. As a component of the settlement of economic issues for fiscal 2010-2011 the parties agree to the following formula for restoration:

- a. The parties shall utilize the Funded Base Revenue Limit [BRL] per pupil for fiscal 2009- 2010 as a base line for restoration.
- b. For each \$200 per ADA subsequent increase to the funded BRL set forth in section (a) above, the district shall pay a one per cent [1%] one-time payment to each employee on or before June 30, 2011 based upon his or her base salary calculation before June 30, 2010.
- c. If the district receives federal stimulus dollars that can be applied as general fund unrestricted dollars for fiscal 2010-2011, which, in effect increase the funded BRL, by \$200 per student, the district agrees to follow (b) as noted above.

3. The parties agree that the remaining .58% will be gained through the following adjustments in practice and language listed below.

ARTICLE 8

HEALTH INSURANCE

8.1 HEALTH BENEFIT LEVELS:

- 8.1.1 Employees shall be covered through the term of this Agreement by health plans provided by the MEBA, except as specifically provided otherwise below.
- 8.1.2 Benefit eligible employees selecting a health maintenance organization (HMO) medical plan will pay 2.75% of the annual vendor premium via tenthly payroll deductions.

Benefit eligible employees selecting a preferred provider organization (PPO) medical plan will pay 20% of the annual vendor premium via tenthly payroll deductions.

8.1.3 When two employees are married and otherwise entitled to benefit coverage individually, the employees may choose from one of the following options: Option 1: The District will waive their health insurance payroll deductions if both employees choose to be covered under one employee plan - either the HMO or PPO option may be selected as 2-party or family coverage. Option 2: When two employees are married, only one employee may choose 2

party or family plan coverage, the alternate spouse must then choose a single party plan with no waiver of either employee's payroll deduction.

8.2 **PRORATED CONTRIBUTION:** For employees who are employed on or after December 1, 1981, who work less than full-time but four (4) hours or more per day, the District will contribute a pro-rata share of the health insurance based on the relationship of hours worked to full-time employment. Current employees hired prior to December 1, 1981, will receive District contributions for medical insurance according to the rules in effect on November 1, 1981 for the term of their current employment.

8.3 DENTAL PLAN:

8.3.1 The District agrees to continue the current dental benefit and coverage until and unless modifications are made pursuant to Section 8.9 below.

8.4 <u>MEDICAL INSURANCE FOR RETIREES RETIREE BENEFITS</u>:

8.4.1 MEDICAL INSURANCE FOR RETIREES: Group medical insurance coverage provided by MEBA will be paid by the District for benefited employees who are age 50 55 or older, have been employed by the District for at least ten (10) years and who retire under PERS. For employees who work less than full-time but four (4) hours or more per day, the District will contribute a pro rata share of the medical insurance based on the relationship of hours worked to full-time employment. Bus drivers will be calculated at a minimum of 6 hours per day. If they retire at a higher number of hours the benefits will be calculated upon the higher number of hours. This provision will apply only to those employees who remain fully retired as defined by the appropriate retirement system. Such benefit shall last until the employee becomes eligible for Medicare, when this benefit will cease.

Should the former employee accept medical, dental, or vision benefited employment with another employer or they are covered by spousal/RDP benefits after retiring from FSD, the dual covered benefit as defined in this section will cease.

- 8.4.2 <u>DENTAL INSURANCE FOR RETIREES:</u> Retirees will receive up to the value of the pro rata single PPO dental coverage until the retiree becomes eligible for Medicare, when this benefit will cease. Retirees may choose to add a spouse or registered domestic partner (RDP) at the retiree's cost.
- 8.4.3 <u>VISION INSURANCE FOR RETIREES</u>: Retirees will receive up to a pro rata two-party vision coverage, until the retiree becomes eligible for Medicare, when this benefit will cease.
- 8.4.4 If the employee elects to have group medical coverage for 8.4.1 his/her spouse or RDP, the District will contribute the entire cost for the two-party HMO plans up to the pro rata share of the cost. based on the relationship of hours worked to full-time employment, for the median value of the lowest two-party HMO plan and the highest two-party HMO Plan. To be eligible for such contribution, an employee shall have his/her spouse covered for at least twelve (12) months prior to retirement. Should the employee choose the two party PPO the employee will pay all costs over the highest cost two party HMO on a monthly basis. This applies to all employees as of January 1, 2003. Retirees may choose to pay the difference for a higher option twoparty plan. To be eligible for such coverage, an employee shall have his/her spouse or RDP covered prior to retirement.
- 8.4.5 If an active benefited employee is laid off or wishes to retire between 7/1/2010 through 6/30/2012, has 10 years of service and is between 50-55 years of age, they may receive pro rata benefits until they are Medicare eligible; subject to the conditions in this article.
- 8.4.6 If an active benefited employee is laid off or wishes to retire between 7/1/2010 through 6/30/2012 the employee may go back to 6/30/08 for the highest number of regularly assigned hours worked on that date to use as the benchmark for pro rata benefit calculation as long as the employee served at least 5 consecutive years at that level, were benefited at the time, and meet all other requirements.
- 8.4.7 <u>Pre-July 1, 2010 Retiree Benefits</u>: Employees who retired prior to July 1, 2010 will continue with their current retiree medical, dental, and vision offering.

ARTICLE 12 – LEAVES

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12.5 OTHER SICK LEAVE: Sick leave days at full pay shall not be included in the 100 half days.

Fullerton School District Board Policy Promotion/Acceleration/Retention

Students Board Adopted: June 10, 2005 Board Revised:

The Board of Trustees expects students to progress through each grade level within one school year. To accomplish this, instruction should accommodate the variety of ways that students learn and include strategies for addressing academic deficiencies when needed.

Students shall progress through the grade levels by demonstrating growth in learning and meeting grade-level standards of expected student achievement.

When high academic achievement is evident, the Superintendent or designee may recommend a student for acceleration into a higher grade level. The student's maturity level shall be taken into consideration in making a determination to accelerate a student.

As early as possible in the school year, the Superintendent or designee shall identify students who should be retained and who are at risk of being retained in accordance with law, Board policy, and Administrative Regulation.

Students shall be identified for promotion, acceleration, or retention on the basis of individual student grades. Other indicators of academic achievement shall also be used include: District benchmark assessment results in language arts, mathematics, and writing; State Standardized Testing and Reporting (STAR) results; report card grades; teacher recommendation; and other relevant achievement data.

When any student in grades 2-8 is retained or recommended for retention, the Superintendent or designee shall offer programs of direct, systematic, and intensive supplemental instruction in accordance with Education Code 37252.2 and Board policy.

Parents may appeal a decision to promote, accelerate, or retain a student by following the procedures prescribed in the Administrative Regulation of the District. The burden shall be on the appealing party to show why the decision by the teacher and the Student Intervention Team (SIT) to promote, accelerate, or retain should be overruled. (Education Code 48070.5 (f))

The Superintendent or designee shall have the final authority in all promotion, acceleration, and retention decisions.

Fullerton School District Board Policy Physical Education

BP 6142.7

Instruction Board Adopted:

The Board of Trustees recognizes the positive benefits of physical activity on student health and academic achievement. The District shall provide all students the opportunity to be physically active on a regular basis through high-quality physical education instruction and may provide additional opportunities for physical activity throughout the school day. The District's physical education and activity programs shall support the District's coordinated student wellness program and encourage students' lifelong fitness.

The District's physical education program shall provide a developmentally appropriate sequence of instruction aligned with the state's model content standards and curriculum framework. The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that the District's program provides students with equal opportunities for instruction and participation regardless of gender in accordance with law.

The District's physical education program shall engage students in moderate to vigorous physical activity, as defined in the accompanying administrative regulation, for at least 50 percent of class or session time. The Superintendent or designee shall develop strategies to monitor the amount of moderate to vigorous physical activity that takes place in the physical education instructional program.

Students with disabilities shall be provided instruction in physical education in accordance with their individualized education program or Section 504 accommodation plan.

During air pollution episodes, extreme weather, or other inclement conditions, physical education staff shall make appropriate adjustments to the program or shall seek alternative indoor space to enable students to participate in active physical education.

Physical Education is a required course of study in grades 1-6 for a total period of time not less than 200 minutes each 10 schooldays (Education Code 51210) and in grades 7-8 for a total period of time not less than 400 minutes each 10 schooldays (Education Code 51222).

Staffing

Physical education instruction shall be delivered by appropriately credentialed teachers who may be assisted by instructional aides, paraprofessionals, and/or volunteers.

The District shall provide physical education teachers with continuing professional development, including classroom management and instructional strategies designed to keep students engaged and active and to enhance the quality of physical education instruction and assessment.

Physical Fitness Testing

The Superintendent or designee shall annually administer the physical fitness test designated by the State Board of Education to students in grades 5 and 7. (Education Code 60800; 5 CCR 1041)

Temporary Exemptions

The Superintendent or designee may grant a temporary exemption from physical education under either of the following conditions: (Education Code 51241)

- 1. The student is ill or injured and a modified program to meet his/her needs cannot be provided.
- 2. The student is enrolled for one-half time or less, of the work normally required of full time pupils.

Permanent Exemptions

Participation in the District's physical education program is required of *all* students.

Independent Study

Independent study for physical education is not offered to students in the Fullerton School District.

Program Evaluation

The Superintendent or designee shall annually report to the Board the results of the state physical fitness testing for each school and applicable grade level. The report to the Board will include the number of instructional minutes offered in physical education for each grade level and other relevant information to evaluate program quality and the effectiveness of the District's program in meeting goals for physical activity.

Fullerton School District Board Policy Courses of Study

Instruction Board Adopted: November 28, 2006 Board Revised:

The Board of Trustees recognizes that a well-articulated sequence of courses fosters academic progress and provides for the best possible use of instructional time. The District's course of study shall provide students with opportunities to attain the skills, knowledge, and abilities they need to be successful in school, college, and/or the workplace.

The Superintendent or designee shall establish processes for ensuring the articulation of courses across grade levels within the District and, as necessary, shall work with representatives of appropriate area Districts to ensure articulation of courses between elementary and secondary schools.

Elementary Grades

The Board shall adopt a course of study for elementary grades that sufficiently prepares students for the secondary school course of study.

Secondary Grades

The District shall offer all otherwise qualified students in secondary grades a course of study that, upon graduation from high school, prepares them to meet the requirements and prerequisites for admission to California public colleges and universities and/or attain entry-level employment skills in business or industry. (Education Code 51228)

Fullerton School District Board Policy Supplementary Instructional Materials

BP 6161.11

Instruction Board Adopted:

The Board of Trustees encourages teachers to use supplementary instructional materials which are relevant to curriculum objectives and compatible with District goals and objectives. By using such materials, teachers can introduce content and instructional strategies that enrich the curriculum, enhance learning, help students make critical judgments, and stimulate their intellectual growth.

Teachers shall carefully preview all supplementary instructional materials in order to ensure that, in their professional judgment, the materials are:

- 1. Directly related to the course of study and aligned to appropriate grade level state standards in which they are being used.
- 2. Appropriate for students' ages and maturity levels.

Supplementary instructional materials must also be consistent with criteria developed for the selection and evaluation of other instructional materials. If the teacher believes that the materials may be in conflict with District criteria, the teacher shall confer with the principal or designee before using them.

When using supplementary materials, teachers shall provide appropriate introductory and follow-up activities. In addition, teachers shall ensure that supplementary materials do not supplant the use of basic texts or teaching activities.

All materials must be used within legal copyright limits.

Videos and Digital Resources

It is expected that teachers utilize District-approved streaming video resources when they are integrating digital video in the curriculum. When a teacher desires to show a video or feature-length film of educational value, the teacher and principal shall preview the video to determine whether, in their professional judgment, it is consistent with District criteria for the selection of instructional materials. Additionally, if a feature-length film is not rated for "General Audience," the teacher must obtain approval from site principal and send the District-approved parental permission form to all parents and guardians prior to utilizing the film resource.

The same criteria will apply to any supplemental digital resources that may be used in the classroom. These may include, but are not limited to podcasts, audio clips, images, and interactive websites.
