Laguna Road School Awarded National Blue Ribbon School for 2020

Laguna Road School in Fullerton School District has received designation as an Exemplary High Performing Schools National Blue Ribbon School for 2020 by U.S. Secretary of Education Betsy DeVos. Laguna Road School is one of 367 schools in the nation and one of only of 36 schools

from California to be recognized in 2020.

The Exemplary High Performing Schools National Blue Ribbon School recognition is based on a school's overall academic performance or progress in closing achievement gaps among student subgroups. The schools receiving this designation are among the state's highest performing schools as measured by state assessments or nationally normed tests.

"Congratulations to this year's National Blue Ribbon School awardees," said Secretary DeVos. "It's a privilege to recognize the extraordinary work you do to meet students' needs and prepare them for successful career and meaningful lives."

The National Blue Ribbon School designation is a coveted award that affirms the hard work of educators, families and

communities in creating safe and welcoming schools where students master challenging and engaging content. Now in its 38th year, the National Blue Ribbon Schools program has bestowed almost 10,000 awards to more than 9,000 schools, with some schools winning multiple awards.

"It is a great honor for a school to receive the National Blue Ribbon designation. This designation recognizes the hard work done to assist students to meet the challenges of the future and prepare for success," said Dr. Julienne Lee, Assistant Superintendent of Educational Services.

The coveted National Blue Ribbon Schools award affirms the hard work of educators. families, and communities in creating safe and welcoming schools where students master challenging and engaging content. This recognition acknowledges a schools student successes as an inspiring example of how teachers, parents, and community leaders can work together to help students prepare for what comes next. Laguna Road School was one of 317 public and 50 non-public schools honored on November 12 and 13, 2020 at the virtual 2020 National Blue Ribbon Schools Awards Ceremony.

PBIS Shines in Fullerton School District

All 20 schools in the Fullerton School District have received the PBIS Community Cares award. The award is given by the California PBIS Coalition. Positive

Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS) is an evidencebased three-tiered framework to improve and integrate all of the data, systems, and practices

affecting student outcomes every day. It is a way to support everyone – especially students with disabilities – to create the kinds of schools where all students are successful.

PBIS is a commitment to addressing student behavior through systems change. When it's implemented well, students achieve improved social and academic outcomes, schools experience reduced exclusionary discipline practices, and school personnel feel more effective.



In response to school closures in March 2020, the California PBIS Coalition chose to implement the PBIS Community Cares recognition system for the 2019-2020 school year. This award temporarily replaced the State-level recognition program (bronze, silver, gold, platinum level awards). Each school was asked to submit a short narrative

and accompanying video, photo, or story that depicted how their school was supporting students, families, and communities during these unprecedented times.

Based on the submissions, all 20 FSD schools were recognized and received the PBIS Community Cares award. This recognition is reflective of the tireless work of each school site in their commitment to PBIS and a testament to the staff effectively implementing PBIS.

Response to Intervention

Response to Intervention (RtI) is a threetiered approach to early identification and support of students with learning needs. At Fern Drive, this process begins the first day

of school with highquality instruction and universal screening for all students.

RtI is a crucial part of student success at Fern Drive. Falcons receive daily targeted. specific instruction in skills they need to fine tune, all with a literacy focus. Areas teachers target include phonemic awareness, phonics, reading fluency, reading accuracy, reading comprehension, grammar, vocabulary development and English Language Development for our identified EL's. Student progress is monitored, and teachers switch students based on progress approximately every eight weeks.

In addition to doing these daily, targeted rotations, our RtI coach meets with students four times weekly to ensure that they are receiving targeted support with additional foundational skills. Falcons are soaring to new heights with literacy skills!

National Schools to Watch Redesignation

Ladera Vista Jr. High School of the Arts has just been redesignated as a National Schools to Watch® (STW) recipient. Ladera Vista originally earned the status as a STW in 2018. Schools that apply to become a STW go through a rigorous process of application, staff input and reflection, and an all-day visitation that reviews the application alongside evidence of student engagement,

parental involvement, as well as academic interventions, enrichments, and opportunities. In order to become redesignated as a STW, schools must provide evidence of the progress on established goals and areas of school-wide

The Schools to Watch® program is organized by the National Forum to Accelerate Middle-Grades Reform, which is an alliance of educators, researchers, national associations, and officers of professional organizations

and foundations committed to promoting academic performance and healthy development of young adolescents. In order to prepare students to be lifelong learners ready for college, career, and citizenship, the National Forum seeks to make every middle-grade school academically excellent, responsive to the developmental needs and interests of young adolescents, and socially equitable.

To accomplish its goal of improved academic and developmental outcomes for all students in the middle grades, the Forum identifies and disseminates best practices, articulates and promotes effective policies, recognizes and develops enlightened leadership, and informs and engages the public.

The National Forum, through its Schools to Watch® program, has developed criteria for identifying highperforming middle-grades schools, created tools to help schools use the criteria, expanded the program to 18 states, and selected and honored 465 successful schools across the country.



A natural extension to our existing computer science pathway, CS week took students beyond an hour of code to apply


their computational thinking skills with new and different

Our Connection Remains Strong

At Richman, one sure thing is that we have come together to continue to grow and stay connected virtually.

An excellent example of this growth and connectedness is our Speech and Debate Team, a dynamic group of 14 students from grades 4-6 and the strong leadership of Mrs. Ninofranco, a sixth grade teacher. The successful delivery of speeches requires

students to memorize, add blocking (hand and body movements), voices, and facial expressions to make them informative, powerful, and entertaining. During virtual practices, students do warm ups, set goals, recite speeches, get coached, praise each other, and give each other feedback.
