In Spring 2023, Fullerton School District's Superintendent's Student Advisory Committee was established, comprising 7th and 8th grade student representatives from junior high and K-8 schools, along with Dr. Bob Pletka and district staff. The primary objective of the committee is to provide students with a platform to identify positive aspects within their respective schools and address challenges they perceive on their campuses. During the first year, the

Committee participated in an anti-bullying campaign or a poster contest aimed at promoting kindness across each campus.

For the 2023-2024 school year, the committee of 22 students chose the theme of "Kindness, Laughter, and Joy," modeled after the FSD Management Retreat. The focus this year is for students to collaborate with District Office staff to enhance student participation and engagement within Fullerton School District. Together, they brainstorm, plan, and execute school-based and community service projects across K-8 and junior high school campuses.

In Fall 2023, committee projects included partnering with Team Kids to organize a student-led carnival, raising funds for a local animal shelter. Additionally, they conducted a jacket and sweatshirt drive for The Hub at Valencia Park Elementary and hosted a bake sale during after-school sports events to support a local non-profit organization.

Spring 2024 projects currently underway include creating and delivering cards to local assisted living facilities, launching "Buddy Day" where kindergarten students pair up with 8th-grade students to explore traditions and activities at Fisler School, organizing baked goods sales to support a local mental health non-profit, and planning a Cultural Fair during lunchtime at Parks Junior High. Students are actively engaged in these projects, demonstrating their commitment to serving their community. The Committee will present an overview of their projects and outcomes for the year at the May Fullerton School District Board of Trustees Meeting.

At the Innovation and Instructional Support department within the Fullerton School District, we are championing an initiative that showcases our commitment to innovative education and community engagement. The construction of a Tiny Home by Nicolas Junior High students aligns with our goals of real-world educational applications. 8th graders in Mucio Vidales' Woodshop II class are building the Tiny Home, while ASB students in Shannon

Glasby's class are documenting the process, and students at Parks Junior High (mentored by former city councilman Jesus Silva) will be presenting on the Tiny Home project to the Fullerton City Council to ask the city to consider allowing tiny homes as one possible solution for our unhoused population.

This project would not be possible without the collaboration of the Facilities and Maintenance and Operations departments who helped establish a relationship with New Dimensions Construction to help

oversee and mentor our students. Securing funding has been crucial, with the Phelps Foundation and the Fullerton Education Foundation have led the way in funding for this project.

This two-year project has included community partnerships with OC United and Pathways of Hope, and we are receiving interest in donations from many local organizations and businesses. IIS has utilized project management to oversee the progression along with Mr. Vidales to ensure funding was provided, materials were purchased, and students remained engaged through creative scheduling to allow building on Saturdays and after school.

As the structure takes shape, we see its implications: fostering empathy, responsibility, and practical skills. Some of the students are now considering construction trades as a career as they see that this can be a viable path for a career and how it can help their community. This Tiny Home will stand as a testament to education's positive impact, reflecting our dedication to meaningful learning experiences.

Nicolas Junior High School Teacher Awarded California League of Educators Middle School Teacher of the Year

Mucio Vidales, teacher at Nicolas Junior High School, was awarded the California League of Educators 2024 Middle School Teacher of the Year. Mr. Vidales was nominated for his educational excellence and his transformational moment as an educator.

This award is granted to a teacher who exemplifies educational excellence and has made significant efforts to implement elements of educational reform. The California League of Educators Educator of the Year award is given annually to California elementary, middle, and high school educators who exemplify educational excellence. As the nominee selected to represent Region 11, which includes Los Angeles and Orange Counties, Mr. Vidales was honored at the California League of Educators Conference held in Monterey, California earlier this month.

To nab the top spot, Mr. Vidales shared his past teaching experience, including elementary to middle school, and in subjects ranging from ELA, Social Studies, Spanish, and Theater, to Woodworking. It was the woodworking class that gave Mr. Vidales his 'aha' moment in teaching. He spoke about the transformational moment when he witnessed a student with destructive behavior become sparked and engaged during a field trip to the Carpenters Union Training Facility.

This moment was such a transformation for Mr. Vidales, that he now teaches five Wood I classes and one Wood II class. The Wood II students are learning carpentry skills to build a tiny house. As part of this Tiny House Project, the students are learning construction trades and becoming agents of change as the tiny home will be shelter for a family in need. This tiny house will provide a Fullerton School District elementary school student and family a safe place to sleep and do homework. Mr. Vidales spoke with passion about the immense pride he has in his students, the amazing growth in their confidence, and the students' ability to thrive in new experiences such as news agency interviews.
